first I do recommend my Soul to God and my Body to be decently
Buried, and touching such worldly Estate wherewithal it has pleased
God to Bless me I Bequeath and give the same as follows

To my beloved wife I command all I possess during
her life or widowhood and at her Death to be sold to the highest
Bidder, and in the first place for my Daughter Jane to have
Thirty pounds out of the same as a present for her particular
attention to me over and above her equal share hereafter mentioned,
also for my son Christopher Woodall to have Twenty pounds out
of the same over and above his equal Legacy hereafter mentioned
and after the sums mentioned and given to my daughter Jane
& Christopher Woodall, that the whole Balance of my Estate
should be equally and fairly divided between my children Now

David Woodall, William Woodall, Elender Kirby, Judith Hall, Jane
Woodall & Christopher Woodall and whereas David Woodall has
received of my Estate Seventy pounds and at the death of my wife
and sale of my Estate both Real & Personal, of the two Legacies to Jane
& Christopher Woodall out of David Woodall's share of the Balance,
my will is that the above mentioned Seventy pounds be deducted
and he receive the balance also William Woodall my son has
been paid out of my Estate Eighty pounds which is to be deducted in
like manner from his equal share, also my Daughter Judith Hall
has had Twelve pounds which is likewise to be deducted out of
her equal legacy as before mentioned and Jane & Christopher to
receive their legacies without any deduction. And do hereby revoke
and disannul all and every other former Wills, ratifying and

To the Worshipful Court of Franklin County in Chancery sitting, the Bill of complaint of Patrick New and Polly his wife, late Polly Early administrator of Joseph Early deceased with whom the said New has intermarried complain of Henry S. Callaway, Wm Callaway Executors of the last Will and Testament of John Early dec'd. that a certain Joseph Early died about thirty years ago, leaving a Will wherein he devised his reversionary interest in the Dover Slaves of his mother in Law Mary Early to his brothers John and Joseph Early, and died leaving his mother in Law, that she has since died and your Orators have become entitled as administrators to one equal moiety of the interest of the said Joseph, that the Executors of John Early, who your Orators pray may be made Defendants to this Bill, are in possession of the slaves, seven in Number, and do not consider themselves at liberty to make distribution of them without the interposition of this court, as the rights and interests of infant children are involved. In tender consideration whereof your Orators pray that commissioners may be appointed to lay off and set the said Negroes to work, and the Defendants equally to the Will of the said Joseph and others and further proceedings may be had as may be necessary.
