In the name of God Amen; I, Wm Smith of lawful age sound mind
& perfect recollection, considering of the uncertainty of life & ignorant when
it may please God to call me away do make & ordain this my Last Will
& Testament hereby revoking every previous disposition of my property
First I wish all my just debts paid & my Executors are requested to do it
for the payment of which I leave all my Estate real and personal
allowing them the discretion of disposing of that part which in their
opinion will suffer least loss from sale. Now I Will & bequeath to my
beloved friend Mary Gaulebury alias, Mary Milam during her natural
life & for her use all my Estate real & personal, that no doubt dispute
or allegation may arise as to the person thus designated by the aforesaid
name; I mean her the aforementioned Mary Gaulebury, Alias Milam
who has for the last thirty years lived with me & who has during that
time, deserved this act of my friendship by a constant exertions to
acquire property & uniform attention to my happiness & prosperity
As this is my most anxious desire, I hope my Executors will use
every measure to protect her rights. & if my Executors with
the above mentioned Mary may think it necessary to sell any
part of my Estate real or personal for the benefit of the above Mary
they are to act as they may think proper. Now after the death of the
aforesaid Mary, I Will & bequeath to Susan Parker her Daughter
& wife of John Parker, my natural child & the heir of her body
legally begotten, the Estate which I have given to her mother
during her life. if however it should please God to call them
away, then I Will and bequeath the Estate to John Parker, should
he be their survivor, for the Executors of this will to take

I Testament I appeared my two friends William A. Burrill & John S. Burrill
 my Executors to settle all disputes which may arise between the parties concerned,
 and having frequently explained to them my wishes & desires, I feel confident
 they will act sufficiently impartial. Having thus disposed of my worldly
 affairs, I shall be ready to resign myself when ever called for, trusting for a perfect
 reliance on the just God for mercy will procure me that felicity in the world to
 come. As Witness my hand this 4th day of June in the year of our Lord Jesus
 Christ 1817.

 ed into and acknowledged their Bond in the Penalty of one Thousand dollars
 conditioned according to Law, Certificate is granted him for obtaining a Probate
 in due form, liberty being reserved to the other Executor in the said Will
 named to join the Probate when he shall think fit. Test Caleb Tate C. J. & Co.

At a Court held for Franklin County at the Court house the third day of September
 1821. On the motion of John S. Burrill one of the Executors named in
 the last Will and Testament of Smith Webb deceased who took the
 oath of an Executor, and together with Wiley P. Woods his security
 entered into and acknowledged their Bond in the Penalty of four hundred
 Dollars, conditioned according to Law, Certificate is granted him to be
