Last Will &  
Testament

In the name of God Amen I Samuel Dorst of Franklin County and State of Virginia Farmer, being sick and weak of Body But of sound Mind and Memory thanks be to God for Mercies calling unto mind the Mortality of my Body and that it is appointed for all Men once to die do make and ordain this my Last Will and Testament that is to say Principally and first of all I recommend my soul into the hands of Almighty God that gave it and my Body to the Earth to be decently Buried at the Discretion of my Executors Nothing Doubting but I shall receive the same again in the Resurrection by the Power of God And as Touching such worldly Goods wherewithal I hath blessed God in his Money to Def<sup>r</sup> me, I Give Demise Bequeath and Dispose of the same in the following manner & form viz First I desire my just Debts and funeral Expences to be paid out of my Estate Secondly I give and Bequeath to Mary my wife her Legal Share in my Estate and Thirdly I give Demise and Bequeath to my son Abraham Dorst the Plantation whereon I now live together with all the Lands I hold adjoining thereto on Stony Creek freely to be possessed and enjoyed by him and his heirs for ever on his paying to my son Jacob Dorst the sum of Twenty five pounds
