this my last Will & Testament, that is to say principally & first
of all I give & recommend my Soul into the hands of

God that gave it. And as for my Body I recommend it to the Earth
to be Buried in a Decent Manner at the discretion of my Executors
hereafter named. And as touching such worldly Goods wherewith
it hath pleased God to bless me with in this life I Give devise
& Dispose of the same in the following Manner to wit
I purposed My Will & mind is that all my just Debts & funeral
Expenses be first paid & Discharged.

Item I give bequeath unto my Son George Hallingsworth my
part of a piece of Cloth that was made betwixt my late
husband & myself & my said Son George & my said Son Lewis
from of Give bequeath to my Daughter Margaret Carter my low
valuable my young Ware.

Item I Give bequeath a Quantity of Linnen yarn that I have at
the present to my 2 Daughters Margaret Carter & Lydia Hall
to be equally Divided between them they being at an equal Charge
for the weaving thereof.

Item I Give bequeath all the Residue of what my husband left me
unto my 2 Daughters Margaret Carter & Lydia Hall to be divided
betwixt them as they shall see meet. Lastly I Nominate &
Appoint my Son George Hallingsworth & my Son in Law Lewis Hall

& Dispose of the same in the following Manner be for me
imprimis My Will & mind is that all my just Debts & funeral
Expenses be first paid & Discharged

Item I give & bequeath unto my Son George Hollingsworth the my
part of a piece of Cloth that was made & bought by my Son John
Hollingsworth & my full & true meaning fulling & dressing of my part
from of Ebenezer bequeath to my Daughter Margaret Carter my Law
& Cal for my young Men

Item I give & bequeath a Quantity of Linnen Yarn that I have at
the present to my 2 Daughters Margaret Carter & Lydia Hall
to be equally divided between them they being at an equal Charge
for the weaving thereof

Item I Give & bequeath all the residue of what my husband left me
unto my 2 Daughters Margaret Carter & Lydia Hall to be divided
between them as they shall see meet

Lastly I Nominate &
Appoint my Son George Hollingsworth & my Son in Law Lewis Hall
my Executors of this my last Will & Testament & the Witnesses whereof
I have hereunto set my hand & seal the second Day of March in the
year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred & forty eight 1748

the 5th day of April 1749
The Will of Anna Hollingsworth Deceased was proved in open
Court by the Oaths of William Glover & James Knight in the Affirma-
tion of Joseph Lupton with respect thereto. And George Hollingsworth
& Lewis Neill the Executors therein named having affirmed,
& made Oath to the same according to Law it was admitted
to Record.

Know all men by these Presents that We Lewis Neill George
Hollingsworth John Hurman John Hope & Robert Allan
are now & jointly bound unto Marques Calmees Gent the
first Justice in the Commission of the peace for Frederick
County for & in behalf of the sole use & behoof of the Justices
of the said County & their Successors in the sum of Two hundred
Pounds to be paid to the said Marques Calmees his Ex^{rs} & Assigns
& Assigns To the which payment well & truly to be made
We bind ourselves & every of us our & every of our Heirs Ex^{rs}
& Assigns jointly & severally jointly by these presents
Sealed with our seals Dated this 5th day of April 1749
