gravances to complain of, and cannot grant us any commercial favors, but in consideration of "political sacrifices," which we were called upon to make and have now made, and insists openly and without disguise "that we accede formally to the principles of the maritime confederacy."

After the appearance of this letter, is it any longer to be doubted, that this war was waged in obedience to the wishes; nay commands of the Emperor
