 just debts to be paid out of any money or levies
 out of my personal property I do give and
 bequeath unto my well beloved wife Elizabeth
 Hull the plantation that I now live on untill
 my son Anderson becomes twenty one years old
 then my son Anderson is to maintain her
 her lifetime and also all the household and
 kitchen furniture, also the loom all the grain
 that is now growing, flax & also horses cattle
 & hags I have given unto my son John Hull one
 bag of powder, a rifle gun I have given unto my
 son Hull his part in land I have given unto
 my daughter Polly Baker property to the am-
 ount of fifty dollars I have also given unto
 my daughter Elizabeth Taylor property to the
 amount of fifty dollars I have also given unto
 my daughter Mary Main property to
 the amount of fifty dollars I also give and
 bequeath unto my well beloved daughter Polly
 Hull the house that Mr. Ledyer now lives in
 and the lot leading up from the house to
 the spring and the little field above the
 orchard (where the old house formerly stood and
 the garden by the house also privileged to
 fruit for her own use the same to be enjoyed
 by her so long as she behaves herself law-
 fully in the family or lives single or until my
 son Anderson Hull is twenty one years old
 I also give and bequeath unto my well
 beloved son Anderson Hull the plantation
 that I now live on so soon as he becomes
 twenty one years old also one rifle gun I also
 give and bequeath unto my well beloved
 daughter Tanny Hull fifty dollars in one bid
 and its property furniture and one cow at their
 valuation and other property that she may need
 to the amount of the above fifty dollars &

soon as she may marry or be come of age I also give
 and bequeath unto my well beloved daughter Melvina
 Hull fifty dollars in property (viz) one bed and
 its furniture also one cow and other property that
 she may need to the amount of the above fifty dol-
 lars at its valuation so soon as she may marry
 or become of age I constitute make and ordain
 my friends Arden Shumate and John McClough-
 lin for the said Executors and my wife Elizabeth
 Hull the Executor of this my last will and tes-
 tament and I do hereby utterly disallow revoke
 and disannull all and every other forms test-
 aments, legacies and wills bequeaths and exe-
 cutors in any wise before named willed and by-
 written ratifying and confirming this and no
 other to be my last will and testament this
 witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and
 seal this 5th day of August 1835

 2nd It is my will that for favors bestowed by my
 sister Mary French P^r and her family I give
 and bequeath to each of her Children an extra
 allowance of one hundred dollars to be enjoyed
 by them forever 3rd I like favors by my sis
 ter Sally McLaugherty Dec^d I give and bequeath
 an extra allowance to each of her three children
 of one hundred dollars to be enjoyed by them
 forever 4th I give and bequeath unto Evalina
 White daughter of Elizabeth White one thousand
 dollars the education clothing &c of the
 said Evalina to be paid out of the bequeathed
 one thousand dollars by my executors at their
 discretion with the balance to be paid to her
 in cash or bonds when she the said Evalina arriv
 in lawful age or at the time of her marriage but
 in case the said Evalina shall have no lawful
 living issue then at at her death and at the death
 of her issue the said bequest to revert to my
