Darius French the former Clerk. The Executor produced to me an exact Copy as he said of the inventory that he delivered to the Clerk from which I have made the foregoing Settlement. I find the amount of assets in the hands of the Executor to be Eight hundred and Seventy dollars and 85 Cents and the amount of claims against the estate exclusive of any compensation which he is not entitled to from the law to be Nine hundred and Fifty seven dollars and twenty two cents which issued leaves the Estate indebted to the Executor in the Sum of Seventy nine dollars 37 Cents. The Executor presented to me receipts for all the claims charged against the Estate though several of them are not authenticated in the usual or proper form all of which receipts are herewith submitted. The said former Clerk also submitted to me some old bills and accounts that came into the hands of the Executor that he says he could not collect and from the last information I have obtained I believe they were and from persons disposed over the County. would have got if she had been living at my death that as a share which would have made her equal to my other children my daughter Sally Kyles three children is to have three hundred dollars in place of a Negro that I was to have given her to have made her equal with my other children my daughter Rebecca Paris deceased four children is to have a equal share if my estate that is the third part of my estate to be paid by my Executors after the division of my estate then first is to be in money and Negroes should one or more of Rebecca Paris four children are before they become of full age the surviving one is to have the deceased ones part my slave before distribution among my children and to be valued by the same men who may fix the value on my lands devised to my children and about named they are to be distributed by my Executors amongst my children who have not received valuable tracts of land or no land at all at this price set on them by the men who may value them as above stated but it is under stood and hereby directed that the children of my daughter Sally Kyles is to have their share in money and Negroes and if one or more of them should be before of lawful age the share of devised to such persons or survive the property only devised to my wife during her natural life and to be paid by my Executors at her death with exception of the slave and the slave they are to be valued by the three intelligent respectable men as aforesaid and the proceeds of the sale of the property and the slave according to their value fixed on them are to be distributed by my Executors among my children so as to make the share of each equal if it should turn out on the valuation of the lands which I have devised to my son and my daughter Rachel Smith that the value of the land devised to either should be more than an equal share after my estate shall be divided in three equal parts the member of children in that count whom shall receive land valued over their equal share and be paid back to my estate so that when my estate be divided my children's share shall be equally allowing Sally Kyles's children and Rebecca Paris children to have one share each that is the share their mothers would have got if they had been living and if the persons to whom the lands are devised or any of them who may have too large a portion shall find to pay to my estate so as to make my children's share all equal as above stated in that case my Executors are directed to sell such parts of the land devised as may be necessary to make up the part they ought to pay my estate and to convey the same to the purchaser and whereas I have devised the land on which I now live to my son David I Chapman that devise is however upon the following condition that my son David I Chapman shall give up the land at the Sulphur Springs purchased from George Dray to be sold for the benefit of my estate and out of the proceeds of the sale of said land my son David is to be paid whatever he may have paid towards said land and whatever he may have paid for improvements made by him on the same and my estate is to be bound to pay the balance of the purchase money which may be owing for said land and I do hereby constitute and appoint my son John Chapman and my son William Chapman and my son David I Chapman Executors of this my last will and Testament reaching and discharging all other and former wills by me made declaring this and this only to be my true and last will and Testament and Testimony whereof
