of all kinds whatsoever to her and her heirs forever
2nd I will my houses cattle and hogs to be sold and after all
any just debts and funeral expenses etc be paid I will the
balance of the money arising from the sale of that each to my
Daughters Polly Frith and Betsy Scott to be divided equally between
them
3rd I give to my grandson Samuel Scott all the balance of my
land supposed to be one hundred and seven acres to him
and his heirs forever
4th I will my Daughter Sally Frith one dollar to her and her and
her heirs forever

And lastly do hereby constitute and appoint my friends Charles
Ring and Thomas Marwood just Executors of this my last will
and testament hereby revoking all other or former wills or testa-
ments by me heretofore made in witness whereof have hereunto
set my hand and affixed my seal this 29th day of August in
the year 1835

And witness In the name of God Amen I Andrew Johnston of the County of Giles and State of Virginia being sick in body but of sound mind and memory and calling into mind the mortality of my body do say that it is appointed for all men once to die as man and retain the my last Will and Testament principally and first of all I give and recommend my soul into the hands of Almighty God who giveth and my body I recommend to the earth to be buried in a decent Christian manner at the discretion of my Executors and touching such estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me wish in this life I give devise and dispose of the same in the following manner and form Nowt

I give and bequeath unto my dearly beloved wife Jane Six hundred dollars in cash to be paid to her by my Executors what is to be at her own disposal I also give and bequeath to her during her natural life the following property to wit One negro boy named Ben and one Negroe Girl named Priscilla Jane & her increased share there being also forty acres of land on which my dwelling house is situate which forty acres is to begin in the center of the wagon road leading from Giles branch House to Chapman and Smidow Ferry where my lands joins the land on which the Town is situated and from that point to extend with my line each way so that a diamond in a cross tract from corner to corner will make the forty acres including my dwelling house and other buildings attached thereto also she is to have ten acres of pasture land on the west side of the wagon road which leads from Roanoke to Petersburg which is to be taken out of a tract of one hundred and forty acres patented in the name of David Johnston and myself to be laid off so as to include a portion of the water in the branch and so as not prevent her passage to other portions of my land also two houses to be her choice of my of houses also five head of cattle twenty head of Sheep and twenty

head of hogs her choice of my cattle Sheep and hogs of breeding are sufficient to carry on the farm hereby devised to her also I give her all my horses hounds and kitchen furniture and loom My Will and desire is that at my death my Executors herein after named take propriety of the following Slaves belonging to me to wit Abigail Henry and Harrison and place them on my River plantation under David Rutledge my overseer or some careful person for the term three years to cultivate said plantation and whatever may raised on said plantation is by my Executors to be applied to the support of my wife and family and the stock which may be retained for the use of said plantation and for the use of my family My object being divide my estate amongst my children as equally as possible I have fixed an estimate on my land which I wish to pay to my sons at the price I have fixed on the same all my land adjoining the Town of Roanoke and although it consists of different tracts of land I call my Town tract of land estimated the same at three thousand dollars all my lands adjoining the land on which my brother David Johnston now lives although it consists of different tracts I call my River tract of land estimated the value of the same at three thousand dollars all my lands and bequeath unto my Son Andrew Henderson Johnston and James David Johnston and their heirs forever my River tract of land valued to them at three thousand dollars also I wish fifty acres of land to be taken off my Town tract of land the part to be taken off is to begin at my corner and goe Hale corner on the River hinc thence to extend along the river hinc with my out side lines to my upper corner and thence out with my lines of rock and an equal distance in the quantity of fifty acres be taken off by striking a straight line across the tract and which leave fifty acres of land to be taken off I estimate at one thousand dollars I also devise and bequeath unto my said Son Andrew Henderson and James David and their heirs forever that part of my Town tract of land which may be taken off and valued at one thousand dollars containing fifty acres as of now which said land thus devised to them they are to have at the expiration of the three years which River tract of land is to be cultivated for the benefit of my family as above stated I devise and bequeath unto my Son Harvey Green Johnston and his heirs forever all my Town tract of land after taking fifty acres off the same for my Son Andrew Henderson and James David as above stated my Son Harvey Green is to have possession of all the land hereby devised to him at my death except the part I have devised to his mother during her natural life and that part he is to have possession of at my wife's decease but it is my wish and desire and I do direct that when my son Harvey Green may arrive at the age of twenty one years or shall marry that then he shall have possession of one part of my dwelling house to be divided by the passage and one half the yard and one half the bond and which partition is to be made by my Executors giving my wife her choice of end and the devise to my wife is to far carried out as

12th I desire that all the stock & other property not devised otherwise, & held in joint
property between myself & my son Edward shall be divided equally at my decease,
& the part belonging to me shall be valued by three disinterested men & my son Edward
shall be permitted to keep the same at the said valuation, except such part as my
wife Jane shall choose.

13th After my funeral expenses all my just debts are paid I leave the residue
of my estate, not herein before named to my wife Jane.

Lastly I do hereby appoint John Johnston (excepted) to my son John as the executor
of this my last will & testament, hereby revoking all other wills. In witness
whereof I have hereunto set my hand & affixed my seal this eighth day of July
in the year of our Lord 1839.

 the said Jonathan died seized. After having valued the slaves
 and taken into consideration the real value of the lands he
 assigned to her as the one third part of his lands above the following
 to wit One old Negro boy named George about 50 years Old
 One old negro woman named Shelia about 55 years old One other
 negro woman named Nancy about 40 years old and a small
 boy named Garrison about 10 years old and they are assigned to her
 out of the real estate the land of Land lying above the mouth
 of East River Containing 100 acres more or less being the sum
 paid on what she now receives which appears to have been
 paid to her Son Jonathan Dierard by reference
 to the Books of Land Surveyor the boundaries will more correctly
 appear the said tract with its appurtenances the undersigned
 believe to be a portion over one third of the whole Real Estate
 but it is inconvenient to make a division of the same there
 fore agree the said Elizabeth Dierard to pay annually on the
 first day of March the sum of \$10 as rent to the heirs of
 the said Jonathan Dierard the first payment by her of the
 sum \$10 to be made on the first day of March 1830 given
 under our hands this 26th day of Nov 1832

I Christian Link of the County of Giles and State of Virginia
 do hereby make this my last Will and Testament in manner and form
 aforesaid to wit:

First I give and bequeath to my son Christian Link in addition
 to him I have heretofore given to him an other field of Land
 lying on the East side of his farm containing 30 acres and also
 20 miles of my old survey as is enclosed in the following bounds
 is cut Beginning at the Old tree at the branch between my
 house and Christian Links and with the fence down the branch
 running directly through the land.

Secondly I give and bequeath to my son Christian Link
 and Henry Link my Negro and every thing appertaining
 thereto my South tools and to remain in the plantation
 (where they now are) and each of my three sons are to have
 an equal interest in land and choose the same as they desire
 to my self.

Thirdly I give to my son William all the lands I purchased
 of from William Dierard lying in Sinking Creek the be-
 ing the land wherein the said William Link now resides.

Fourthly I give to my wife Mary my Negro man Mandie
 Bob two work horses his mitch Coe & choice of the cows
 One half of my Stock of hogs this has since their families
 and the balance of my hogs I give to my son Henry and
 at the decease of my self I also give to my son Henry
 my Negro man Bob and to the other personal property and
 my plantation as the worth of my wife and none of my
 property is to be sold by taxators.

Fifthly I give to my son Henry Link for the benefit of
 my Daughter Polly Summerfield's Daughter Mary when she
 gets married the following tract of land beginning at the corner
 of the Richard fence thence west corner to post hill line then
 to with the same a south course to the river line then an
 easterly course and opposite to the beginning goes to
 make a Point line following a crop fence to the Beginning
 but the Henry Summerfield is to retain no property or
 part of the said land until his marriage.

Sixthly I give to my Daughters Catharine and Esther to
 be paid her by my Executor.

Seventhly I give to my son Henry all the lands I can
 not heretofore assign to my sons Christian & William
 and my son Henry for the benefit of my Daughters Polly
 Summerfield's Daughter Mary
 under all my money and all other stuff becomes
 to me at any time together with any other property
 which may be on the plantation at the death of my
 wife Elizabeth I give to my Daughter Elizabeth
