will

In the name of God Amen I Alfred Dunham Mithus, of the County of Gloucester, in the State of Virginia, being of sound mind disposing mind and memory, do make this my last will and testament, hereby revoking all former Wills by me at any time heretofore made. First I direct my Executors hereafter named, to pay without delay all of my just debts including a debt of (\$500) Five hundred dollars, to my friend Thomas C. Davis now residing abroad and the interest thereon. Second I give and bequeath to the United States Trust Company of the City of New York in trust for my daughter Virginia Mithus, the sum of twenty thousand (\$20,000) dollars and direct that the income thereof be paid to my said daughter for and during her natural life quarterly yearly or semiannually as she may direct. Gloucester County, Virginia Will 2762-1890 www.virginiapioneers.net I direct that she may at any time and at any place to go to, and be divided among her children; but if she have no child or children then living and no descendant of such child or children the same is then to pass and descend to my heirs at law.

Third All the rest residue and remainder of my estate, real and personal of every kind and wherever situated I give devise and bequeath to my two sons William B. Mithus and Alfred M. Mithus, equally to be divided between them, to them and their heirs forever, and I authorize my son Alfred, to have my Eagle Point Plantation in Gloucester County, put into his half or share at the valuation of ten thousand (\$10,000) dollars if he desires and elects so to do. Fourth, I appoint my two sons, William B. Mithus and Alfred M. Mithus Executors of this my will, and request the Court to allow them to qualify as such without giving security.
