I desire and direct that all of my just debts be paid as soon as possible after my decease. I leave to my wife, Mary C. Heywood, all of my estate, both real and personal, for her absolute use and benefit during her life, and it is my wish that my executor, hereinafter mentioned, collect and lease out as he may think best whatever money I may have loaned out and collect the interest annually and pay the same unto my beloved wife, Mary C. Heywood, annually as long as she may live. At the death of my beloved wife, Mary C. Heywood I leave unto my two grand daughters Mary Frances Heywood and Sarah Cloan Heywood my whole estate both real and personal, to be equally divided between the two for their use and benefit during their lives, and it is my wish that if either of my said grand daughters die without issue, the surviving one shall have the whole of my estate, both real and personal during her life. At the death of my two grand daughters, it is my wish that my great grandchildren if any shall have all of my estate both real and personal. If both of my grand daughters die having no issue, it is my wish and direction that my estate be equally divided between my own and my beloved wife relations. And I

Robin, cousin, to be the executor of this my last will and testament. Battell being sworn deposed that they

are well acquainted with the hand writing of the said J. G. Nelson and W. Nelson and verely believe that their signatures are in their own proper hand writing, whereupon the said Will was ordered to be recorded as the last Will and testament of James M. Heywood deceased and is recorded.
