I, John Prosser Tabb of the County of Gloucester, and State of Virginia, being of sound mind and body, do make this my last will and Testament: revoking all others hitherto made by me.

After the payment of such debts as may be justly due by me,

I give and bequeath the remainder of my property to my son John Prosser Tabb in trust for the following purposes: to wit; that he shall pay to his Sister Rebecca Lloyd Tabb any income derived therefrom until she arrive at the age of twenty one years or marry, on the happening of either of which events, the principal shall be paid to her; ^{Gloucester Co. Virginia Wills 1862-1896} ^{www.virginiapioneers.net} ~~but should she die before attaining the~~ age of twenty one or unmarried the property mentioned herein shall be divided equally between my surviving children. I wish now to state distinctly that this discrimination in favor of my daughter Rebecca is not made because I love her more than my other children, God forbid, they have all been so loving, so tender, so dutiful, that to make a distinction would be impossible, but the amount is too small to be divided, the others having received something to remember me by and will appreciate my motives I am sure. I appoint John Prosser Tabb my Executor and request him to qualify as guardian of his Sister Rebecca. Written entirely in my own hand writing signed and sealed by

At a County Court begun and held for Gloucester County at the Courthouse on Monday the 5th day of January 1885 this paper writing purporting to be the last will and Testament of John Prosser Tabb deceased was produced in Court for proof, and there being no subscribing witness to the same, John B. Donovan and James Dabney being sworn deposed that they are well acquainted ^{with} the hand writing of the Testator and truly believe that the said paper and signatures thereto were wholly written by the Testator's own hand, whereupon the said paper was ordered to be recorded as the true last will and Testament of John Prosser Tabb deceased and is recorded.
