

Wm F. Hall: I William F. Hall of the County of Gloucester and State of Virginia
Will do make this my last Will and Testament revoking all other wills heretofore
 made by me -

First, I wish all my just debts and funeral expenses paid as soon after
 my death as practicable -

Second - My Will and desire is, and I so direct that all my estate
 real and personal after the payment of my debts shall be kept together for
 the maintenance and support of my wife and I hereby devise and bequeath
 the same to my said wife for her life, the rents issues and profits thereof
 to be used by her for her support and maintenance, she to use each
 of the personal property and to make sale of same if necessary for her
 support.

After the death of my said wife I devise and bequeath the property
 then remaining of my estate as follows -

I give and bequeath unto the Society
 for the relief of the Preachers of the Virginia Conference, Methodist Episcopal
 Church South and their families their widows and orphans chartered by
 the State of North Carolina on the 16th day of February 1870 the sum
 of Fifty dollars to be paid by my Executor or Administrator to the
 Treasurer of said Society, for the uses thereof.

✓ To the four children of Joseph H. Padgett, Maria, Robert, Margaret and
 Matilda Padgett or to the survivors of them I give and bequeath the sum
 of twenty five dollars each, but should all of the said children ^{die} before
 my said wife or before coming twenty one years of age leaving no issue
 of their bodies then this bequest is void and the amounts hereby
 bequeathed to them to return to my estate.

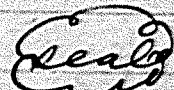

The balance of my estate I give and bequeath to Mary Blake now living with me and to my brother James T. Hall that is to say one half thereof to Mary Blake in fee simple, and the other half to James T. Hall for his life only, the profits arising therefrom to be used by him for the benefit of himself and family, but not to be subject to any debt which he may or has contracted, and after his death I give and bequeath the same to his children then living or the children of any who may have died.

I direct that my Executor hereafter named to pay to John B. Cooke his heirs or assigns the sum of ten dollars for writing this Will.

I hereby nominate and appoint my wife Ruth E. Hall as my Executor and request the Court will permit her to qualify without giving security.
