I Give Devise and bequeath to said Wife all the rest of my Estate real and personal to her and her heirs forever, and do constitute and appoint her Executor of this my last Will and Testament revoking all Wills by me heretofore made and do appoint that my Estate be not appraised in Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and Seal this Second day of Decemb. one thousand seven hundred and forty two.
