In the presence of His Honor J. Lincoln Taylor being sworn in body but of a perfect mind and understanding, calling to mind the state of soul which, knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, do make and declare this my last will and testament first of all I recommend my soul into the hands of God that gives it and my body to the same, nothing desiring but it shall be raised up again at the last day of general resurrection. And as touching my temporal estate which with it hath pleased God to bless me in this life, I dispose of in the following manner. First my lease and testament is that all my just debts and funeral expenses be satisfied and paid 2 day after my decease, I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Betty Taylor the fifty acres of land where she lives and all my goods and chattels during her life. I give to my son William Taylor the hundred acres of land at the white top. I give to my son John Taylor the fifty acres of land on the north side of the River I give to my son James Taylor fifty acres of land on the east side of the River. I give to my son Benjamin Taylor fifty acres of land on the east side of the River. I give to my son Nathan Taylor fifty acres of land on the east side of the River, of the one she is now big with is a boy I give him the other fifty on the river, and if not a boy all to John Taylor I give to my daughter Mary Taylor a cow, I give to my daughter Betty Taylor a cow, I give to my daughter Fanny Taylor a cow if the one she is big with is a girl, I give her a cow, I do hereby ordain my John Davis and Benjamin Landrith to be my Executors of this my last will and testament whose unto I have set my hand this 24th day of March A.D. 1822.
