 my last Will and Testament, in manner and form as followeth:
 Imprimis, I give and bequeath unto my Sons, Wilkins and Washington
 Goodrich, the Lands and plantation which I purchased of Henry Faywell Esq.
 to be as equally divided between them as possible, by my friends, to wit,
 Amistead Goodrich, Esq. Edwards, Nath. Rives, Joel Wilkinson
 and

484) and Robt. Spencer Jun^r; on this proviso, that each of my aforesaid Sons is to
have the place which he now possesses, and that my aforesaid friends, are to pay
no respect to the improvements on either place, in the Division, and among
three, or more of my above mentioned friends, who shall put their signatures
to the Division of the above Lands, shall be obligatory; to them and their
heirs forever. I then give and bequeath unto my Son Edmund Goodrich,
the Land and plantation whereon I now live, together with the land &

Drawers, one large Trunk, also one fourth part of the Tob^o that may be
made on the plantation the Present year, Thirty Barrels of Corn, one half

hoes, Two narrow hoes, one grubbing hoe, Two Plough hoes, and two axes; two
cains and calves.

Two Cows and Calves, which he now has in possession, on this proviso, that he
gives up the £ 15, which I was to give him for his services, as an overseer,
for the year 1796, all to him and his heirs forever.

Dolly, and old Nanny, one Bed and furniture, my Desk and Book Case, &
Two cows and Calves, which he now has in possession, on this proviso, that he
gives up the \$15, which I was to give him for his services, as an overseer,
for the year 1796, all to him and his heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath unto my daughter Amy W. Larnier, one Bed and
furniture, one Chest of drawers, my grey Java Colt, and one hundred Pounds
out of the Debt I owe me, all to her and her heirs forever. I also lend
my said Daughter the following Negroes, to wit, Patti, and her five Children,

485 to wit, Betty, Tom, Shuby, Patey, and Hannah; Beck, Sam, and Archer son of
little Juby, all during her natural life, and after her death, to the lawful
heirs of heirs of her Body, if there be any, if not, to be equally divided among
my other Children, or their heirs. The terms of the above Item were agreed to by
Edmund Sanier and Amy his Wife in presence of Jesse Atkins and Howell
Pach, before the negroes were carried away. Item, I give and bequeath
unto my daughter Frances Goodrich, the following negroes, and their future
increase, to wit, old Hannah, Sarah and her Child Claiborne, Judith and her
Children, to wit, Wooley, James, Daniel, and Lucy, and China; one Bed and
furniture, one Chest of Drawers, my bay Swiss Horse and the filly by her side,
and one hundred and twenty five Pounds, out of the debts I do owe me, all to her
and her heirs forever. Item, I give and bequeath unto my daughter
Rhoda Goodrich the following ~~the~~ negroes and their future increase, to wit,
Andrew, Jeff, great Judith, Polly, Charlotte, and her son of great Judith,
little Andrew, Milly, and Phill; one Bed and furniture, one Chest of drawers,
the Colar filly and her increase, which they have been possessed with sometime;
also one hundred Pounds, out of the debts I do owe me, all to her and her heirs

Item, I give and bequeath unto my Son Robt. M. Goodrich, the Tract of Land that formerly belonged to his mother, lying in Brunswick County, and the Negro Woman Hannah, a Negro fellow by the name of Bobb whose I purchased of Nathaniel Edwards, which fellow Bobb is in lieu of a Negro boy by the name of Ben which formerly was his Mother's, one bed and furniture, that his Mother used to lie on, one pine Press, one pine Chest painted red, and on proviso that my said Son Robt. should claim nothing more of the property that belonged to his Mother, I give him the following property, to wit, Aggy and her three Children, to wit, Matthew, Delphy, and Cyus, Michael, Pinah, Nanny, and their future increase; also One hundred and sixty Pounds with Int. from ^{my} decease, out of the debts I owe me, all to him and his heirs forever. — Item, I give and bequeath unto Evans Maby's Children equally, a Judgment I obtained against the said Maby in the County Court of Greensville for one hundred Pounds.

Goodrich Executors of this my last Will and Testament, desiring that
no appraisment may be made of my Estate, and that my said Executors
may sell any part of my Estate not already devised, reserving a sufficiency
for the support of the family the present year, at any time they may think
proper, and at the expiration of the present year, the balance to be sold,
and the profits arising therefrom, together with what may be due me,
after paying my just Debts, and legacies herein devised, to be equally
divided among all my Children, or their heirs. — I should be glad.
