In the name of God Amen I Edward Gray of Greensville County  
 make this my last Will and Testament in words as follows  
 that is to say; first of all my just debts and funeral expenses to be paid  
 Then I give and bequeath to my Son Edward Gray the Sum of Fifty Dollars  
 de money in his possession with such other kind of property he may have  
 from his heirs and assigns forever; I also give and bequeath to my  
 daughter Susanna Epper the slaves now in her possession to wit Sarah, Re-  
 Isaac, Doll, Rhoda, Ned, Selby, Betty, Patience, Abner & Charlotte  
 to her and her heirs and assigns forever; I then I give and bequeath to my  
 Son Edmund Gray, the following Negroes, to wit Lucy and Sarah to have  
 his heirs and assigns forever; I also give to my said Son Edmund Gray the  
 Land and plantation lying in Dinwiddie County left to me by my Uncle  
 Edward Mitchell the other part of said Land whereon my said Uncle  
 lived being left to Thomas Jones and since the death of said Jones sold  
 by his son John Jones and myself in order to make an equal division between  
 Jones and myself, of which I became the purchaser, now I give the whole

I give and bequeath unto my said daughter Mary the sum of five hundred pounds  
 now in his possession with every other kind of property he doth own or have  
 to him his heirs and assigns forever - I give and bequeath unto my daughter  
 Susanna Eppes the plantation in her possession to wit South Hill  
 Isaac, Doll, Rhoda, Willm. Lacey, Abby, Pelina, & her Charlotte  
 to her and her heirs and assigns forever, I give and bequeath to my  
 son Edmund Glegg the following negroes, some land and other things  
 his heirs and assigns forever, I also give to my said son Edmund Glegg the  
 said and plantation lying in Dinwiddie County left to me by my uncle  
 Edward Mitchell the other part of said Land whereon my said Uncle  
 lived being left to Thomas Jones, and since the death of said Jones sold  
 by his son Green Jones, and myself in order to make an equal division between  
 Jones and myself, of which I became the purchaser, now I give the whole  
 of said Land and plantation with the premises thereto belonging  
 provided he pay to his Mother or her Order Ten pounds Year for Ten  
 years.

 to my Daughter Martha Williams three Negroes to wit Fanny  
 Selah, and Long with <sup>other</sup> my land of property hereafter given to her  
 and her heirs and assigns forever. I am I give and bequeath to my  
 Daughter Elizabeth Adams two Negroes Miss & Lewis with every  
 other kind of property hereafter given and now in her possession to  
 her and her heirs and assigns forever. I am I give and bequeath to my  
 Daughter Miss Mary three Negroes to wit William & two younger  
 Children viz. Nigel and Tom. to her and her heirs and assigns forever.  
 I am I give and bequeath to my Grand Daughter Susan Russell Adams  
 three Negroes viz. Cypis, Jim, and Mattie, provided she arrives to  
 lawful age & married to be her heirs and assigns forever.  
 I am I give and bequeath to my Son Bunel Gray when he arrives to  
 the age of Twenty one years, three Negroes to wit Jim, Judy, and Peter  
 & also give to my said Son Bunel Gray the Land and plantation  
 part of Frederick Gray with a beautiful of the tract which I give  
 to be taken by a line to be begun at the mouth of a small branch

head of the said land with a small part of the Tract which I have  
to be taken up by a line to be run at the mouth of a small branch  
known by the name of my Pond Branch thence up the said Branch is  
the head and thence a straight line to the corner of said Land of the  
Bucklows and the Land whereon I now live to him and his heirs  
a fee simple forever — I have also given and bequeath to my son Mitchell  
Gregg, three Negroes to wit Gibson Clarissa & Frank which Negroes  
to be of the age of Twenty one years. I also give to my said son Mitchell Gregg  
all the Residue of my Lands in the County of Greensville, after the  
Death of his Mother, to him and his heirs and assigns forever —  
I have also given to my loving Wife Mary Gregg all my Lands in Greensville  
County, during her Natural life with the following Negroes to wit old  
Tadpole Gafford Ephraim Sam Charles Phil and George, and also  
say that I have given to my two Sons Bursal Gregg & Mitchell Gregg  
until they arrive to the age of Twenty one years, with my Stock of every  
kind, household furniture and plantation utensils the keeping and  
ing and clothing my two Sons Bursal & Mitchell, and keeping that  
book should be set out to the said Bursal & Mitchell

a feoff's feuer — I give and bequeath to my son Mitchell  
Gigg, three Negroes to wit Gibson, Clarissa & Frank when he arrives  
to the age of Twenty one years, I also give to my said son Mitchell Gigg  
all the Remainder of my Lands in the County of Greensville, after the  
Death of his Mother, to him and his heirs and assigns forever —

I give to my loving Wife Mary Gigg, all my Lands in Greensville  
County, during her Natural Life with the following Negroes to wit old  
Tadpole, Rufford, Epitumum, Charles, Phil and George, and also  
say that I have given to my two Sons, Burrell Gigg & Mitchell Gigg  
until they arrive to the age of Twenty one years, with my Stocks of money  
Cash, household furniture and plantation utensils she keep in  
my and Clothing my two Sons Burrell & Mitchell, and keeping that  
part of my Estate together during her Life, and lastly at the Death of  
my said Wife Mary Gigg all the remainder of my Estate, of what  
Nature or kind soever, or wheresoever found, I give in manner & form

following to my Son Burrell Gigg one feather Bed and furniture and my  
 Medley Colt to my Son Mitchell Gigg one feather Bed and furniture and my  
 Dogfish Colt to my Daughter Mary Gigg one feather Bed and furniture to my daughter  
 Martha Williams one hundred Dollars to my Daughter Elizabeth Adams one  
 hundred Dollars hereby appointing my Sons Samuel Gigg Edmund Gigg & Thomas  
 Williams my Executors leaving it in their power to continue the plantation in dis-  
 -missed until the same is paid for with the benefit of Time and Labor and the Proceed-  
 -ings of my Estate of every kind left to be equally divided between and between to wit  
 Samuel Gigg, Edmund Gigg, Burrell Gigg, Mitchell Gigg, Mary Gigg, Martha  
 Williams and Elizabeth Adams to them and their heirs and assigns forever and  
 hereby revoking all other Wills or bequest by me heretofore made declaring this to be  
 my only last Will and Testament this Twentieth Day of October 1807.
