The Executrix therein named refused to join in the said Probate.

I Elizabeth Johnson of the County of Greenville being sick and weak of Body, but of sound Mind and memory and calling to mind the Mortality of the Body, and that it is appointed for all men to die, I do make this my last Will and Testament. My Soul I give to God who gave it me, and my Body I recommend to the Earth, from whence it came And as to what worldly Goods it has pleased God to bless me with, I do give and bequeath in manner and form following. *IMPRIMIS*. I lend the use of my Land and Plantation, lying in the County of Greenville unto my Daughter Rebecca Lucas induring her Life to her proper use, and after her Life I give and bequeath the

The same plantation unto my Grand Daughter Elizabeth Johnson unto her &
her Heirs forever. Item I lend unto my Daughter Rebecca Lucas, One Sorrel
cow, four head of cattle, with all my Household and Kitchen furniture, All
my moveables of every kind except one Bed and furniture, which I do give and
devise unto my Grand Daughter Elizabeth Johnson, induring her Life, and after
her Life, I desire that the same goods be equally divided among her two Children
Polly Lucas and Benjamin Lucas, to them and their Heirs forever. Item I
give and bequeath unto my Grand Daughter Elizabeth Johnson, One Negro
Woman named Lettice, One Negro Girl named Phillis unto her and her Heirs
for ever. Item I give and bequeath unto my Grand Daughter Polly Lucas
One Negro Girl named Lucy to her and her Heirs for ever. Item I give and
bequeath unto my Grand Daughter Patsy Johnson, One Negro Boy named
Bob. unto her and her Heirs for ever. Lastly if my Grand Daughter
Elizabeth Johnson should not live to marry or come of Age I desire that the
beacy left her to return and to be equally divided among my two Grand
Daughters Patsy Johnson and Polly Lucas unto them and their Heirs forever.
