Bed and furniture and One horse Colt known by the name of Spider
My Will and desire is that if my son Samuel Dies before he comes
of Age or without Issue I will be that all the Land on the South

Land on the North side to Descend to my son John Clark

25) I give to my Son Henry Clark a Tract of Land lying on the
great Swamp beginning at the Mouth of the Hawk Branch thence up
the said Branch to the head thence by a line of marked trees to Burnetts
Papers line And my desire is that if my Son Henry Clark Dies before
he comes of Age or without lawful Issue that my Son Charles Clark
should have the Land that I have Will'd to Henry Clark Also I give
to my Son Henry One feather Bed and furniture and twenty Pounds
Cash to be raised out of my Estate in lieu of a Horse I give to my
Son Charles Clark the Plantation wherein I now live also my Friends
Side and all my Cyder barrels and One feather Bed and furniture and
Twenty Pounds Cash to be raised out of my Estate in lieu of a Horse.
I give to my Daughter Charlotte White my Negro girl named
Beck and One feather Bed and furniture I give to my beloved
Wife the use of my Mill till my Son Sam. comes of Age. Also I lend to my
Wife during her life or widowhood the my mill & also is paid the Plantation
wherein I now live and all the remainder part of my Estate at my
Death whatsoever nature it stand it be to raise and school my children
and after her Death or Marriage to be sold and the Money equally
divided amongst all my surviving children and my desire is that my
Wife and Friends find Papers and I am not sett as the sole executor
of this my last Will and Testament but as one of the executors with all other

Wife and Friends John Cooper and John Pitt. Sett in the sole execution
of this my last Will and Testament and do hereby revoke all other
Wills and former Testaments (As Witness my hand and Seal this
fifteenth day of December 1703.

At a Court held for Greensville County the 20th day of October 1704
This Will was proved according to Law by the Oaths of Joshua Beams and
John Pitchett Witnesses thereto and Ordered to be recorded And on the
motion of Charlotte Clark and John Pitchett two of the Executors therein
named who made Oath thereto and together with William Andrews and
Francis Dancy their Securities entered into and acknowledged their
Bond in the Penalty of six thousand Pounds conditioned as the Law
directs Certificate was granted them for obtaining a Probate thereof
in due form Liberty being reserved for the other Executor to join in
in the said Probate when he may think fit
