 the Balance of my Estate not heretofore disposed of shall be Equally divided between my four sons
 Isaac B. Walton, Lewis Washington Walton, Joseph Wellbourn Walton, and Peter Walton, on
 the before named third of January next the second Eight hundred and twelve, my Will & desire is
 that my son Peter Walton shall from the time of the Division Receive his property at his own
 disposal and let: And as for himself which said Will & desire shall be lawful with the
 Assent of my sons, my desire is that should my son Peter Walton think proper to go to
 School between this and the before named third of January Eight hundred & twelve for
 Schooling and Boarding shall be paid out of my Estate if Boarded from the plantation in
 my manner & so desire is when my Lands shall be divided between my four sons there is no
 Respect to be paid to the mill the being Equally divided before - My Will and desire is that
 When the Division shall take place as all my children is of age, they may divide any part
 or parcel of my Estate, Lands or Negroes, to ^{such} ~~mut~~ themselves & in case they cannot agree
 or division between themselves they may choose good men to assist in the Division
 who said I desire they may all make by the aid of good men & my Will & desire
 that there be no Inventory or Appraisement of my Estate Returned to Court, & that
 there be no order for decree for the Division of my Land or Negroes But for them
 to do as it shall please themselves & so hereby Appoint my sons Isaac Lewis Washing-
 ton B. Walton, and Peter Walton as Executors to this my last will & testament.

Respect to be paid to the will of my saids I have devised before my will and desire is that
When the Division is to take place as all my lots & lands is of big, they may divide any part
or parcel of my Estate, Land or Negroes, to ^{suit} ~~with~~ themselves & in case they cannot agree to
a Division between themselves they may choose good men to assist in the Division
which said Division they may all make by the best of good mind & my Will & desire
that there be no Inventory & Appraisement of my Estate Returned to Court & that
there be no Order or decree for the Division of my Land or Negroes But for them
to divide it to suit themselves, I do hereby Appoint my sons Isaac Lewis Wainwright
Joseph Wainwright, and Peter Watton, as Executors to this my last will & Testament. Discharge
I hereby sign all others heretofore made by me in this manner. I have hereunto set my
hand & affixed my seal this 23rd Day of February one thousand eight hundred and ten.
