

Greensville County, Virginia Wills, Book 2, 1806 to 1816
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In the name of God Amen John Battle of Greensville County
being weak of body but of disposing memory and a sound mind but
not retaining now some men thought may come to appoint this to be my
last will and testament as to my worldly goods it hath pleased god to
bless me with I do will and give as follows I give to my
Daughter Polly Locke ten Shillings to her and her heirs forever. I give
I give to my son Andrew Battle all the things he hath in possession
with the tract of land where he now lives beginning at the corner
of a corner past the old mill race and the same place along said old mill
race up said branch to the same place along said old mill
race to a corner thence along the river line to a corner thence to the
Matthew Andrew line to a corner thence a short line to the first cherry
thence along the corner of Battle line to a spring thence by suches spring
thence down the said branch to a small mouth of a branch just below a
small dam from thence up said branch to the head and along a ditch
from thence to the beginning thence along a new cut like a crop Moore
swamp to the edge of an old field thence along the old field to a hickory
thence to a corner on Moore swamp to him and his heirs forever. I give I
give to my daughter Polly Battle all the things she hath in possession with

small dam from thence up said branch to the
fence from thence to the beginning thence along a new cut takes a cross-roads
swamp to the edge of an Old field thence along the old field to a hickory
thence to a corner on Moss swamps to him and his heirs forever. Here I
give to my daughter Martha Jones the things she hath in possession with
the money Mr. Edmund Jones is bearing her a large much more as will
make up that sum One hundred pounds to her and her heirs forever.
Item I give unto my son Henry Battle the things he hath in possession
with one tract of land I bought of Nathan Wittington beginning at a corner
Oak on this side the Indigo pond thence thence along Alexander M. Battle line
to a corner on Cox land thence down to the head of a Mill pond thence down
the said branch to Washington Goodriches line thence along said Goodriches line
to a corner on the Old field thence along Goodriches line to Dickson Vaughn
line thence along said Vaughn to the beginning to him and his heirs forever
also fifty more pounds to him and his heirs forever. Here I give unto my
son Thomas Battle the tract of land wherein I now live beginning at a
mouth of a small branch at the head of the Race path and just below
a small dam thence up said branch to the head thence along a ditch

from thence a straight course to a corner Oak on M. Wyatts line thence
 along a new Chapel line to the edge of the Old field.
 thence down the edge of the Old field to a large Hickory thence to a corner
 white Oak in Moss swamp on M. Wyatts line thence down the said
 swamp to a corner thence along M. Wyatts line to M. Matheys corner
 thence along M. Matheys to M^{rs} Pettinys thence along M^{rs} Pettinys
 to Moss swamp thence down the swamp to the road thence up the
 road to a corner on Lofa Vaughans land thence along said Vaughans
 land to a corner thence to a road and along said Vaughans land to a
 corner below the China store & Washington Colobuckers line to a corner on
 Dicksons Vaughans line thence along said Vaughans line to Alexander W. Bates
 line thence along said Bates line to the beginning with Martin Rogers
 namely Harry, Dick, Lewis, Peter, John, Isaac, Mally, Henry, James
 Charles, Lewis, James, with all my horses, Mules, Cattle, pigs, sheep
 tools, plantation utensils and house hold and kitchen furniture and
 all kind grain what ever more is that Thomas Bates should have
 all the money by me and all my debts to pay all my bills and as what
 I have not given away both real and personal my share is shall go to my
 son Thomas Bates to have and his heirs forever As Witness whereof
 I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 10th day of June 1861

 I have subscribed at my hand and seal this eighth day of January
 one thousand eight hundred and eleven

 to Law by the Oaths of Thomas Vaughan, William
 B. Howwell and William Lewis witnesses thereof

and ordered to be Recorded. and there being no Executor named in the
 said Will an Motion of Thomas Belle who made Oath and together
 with Nicholas Maly and Randolph Grigg his Securities entered into
 and acknowledged their Bond in the ^{conditioned as the law directs} penalty of fifty thousand Dollars,
 Certificate is granted him for Claiming Letters of Administration of the
 said decedent's Estate with his Will aforesaid annexed in due form
