to God for the same) and calling to mind the mortality of the body do
make and ordain this my last Will and Testament in manner and
form as followeth. I give and bequeath unto my
loving wife Mary Spencer one Negro boy named Harry to her
and her heirs forever I lend my said wife the land and plantation
whereon I now live the House hold and kitchen furniture
plantation utensils &c. together with the following Negroes namely
old Cato, Hannah, Betty, Phill, and Sarah, the peccant crops of
every kind and one third of my cattle, Sheep and Hogs, one bay
Mare, one black Colt, and a Horse called Tom Bolling, during her
natural life or widowhood also one Riding Chair.

I give and bequeath to my son Thomas Spencer the land
and plantation whereon he now lives (deeded by me to him) and
the following Negroes namely Jesse, Edmund, Rhuben, Aggy and
her increase since in his possession to him and his heirs forever.

I give and bequeath to my son Robert Spencer the land

I then I give and bequeath to my son Thomas Spencer Medland and plantation whereon he now lives (deeded by me to him) and the following Negroes namely Jesse, Edmund, Rhubert, Aggy and her increase since in his possession to him and his heirs forever.

I then I give and bequeath to my son Robert Spencer Medland and plantation whereon he now lives (deeded by me to him) and the following Negroes namely Joe, Bicy, Grace, and their increase since in his possession and account five pounds in current Money of Virginia to him and his heirs forever.

I then I give and bequeath to my son Elliot Spencer Medland and plantation whereon he now lives containing three hundred and twenty eight $3\frac{1}{4}$ Acres be the same more or less and the following Negroes namely Barney, Adam, Cyrus, Mary and her increase since in his possession to him and his heirs forever.

I then I give and bequeath to my Daughter Nancy Harrell the following Negroes namely Joe, Harry, Sally, Judah, and their increase

increase since in her possession, satisfy friends, Current Money of
Virginia to her and her heirs forever.

Greensville County, Virginia, Nov. 2, 1816

Item, I give and bequeath to my daughter Spencer the land and
plantation called his, containing three hundred and thirteen and $\frac{3}{4}$
Acres to the same more or less, and the following Negroes namely
Tom, Anthony, Ben, and Army to him and his heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary Maclin the
following Negroes, to wit, Merina and her child Alfred, Grace,
and Billy to her and her heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath to my daughter Catharine Spencer the
following Negroes to wit, Jincy and her two children Judith and
Tanny, and Peter to her and her heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath unto Nancy Perry and her sister Polly
Taylor a Negro Woman named Fanny and her three children
to wit, Lizzy, Kizzy and Billy to be equally divided to them and
their heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath unto John Perry a Negro Boy
named Joe to him and his heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath unto James Perry a Negro Boy,

named Jesse to him and his heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath unto Lucy Perry a Negro Woman named Lydia to her and her heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath the rest and residue of my Estate both, real and personal not already devised, after, ^{for} ~~paying~~ ^{of} my just debts, reserving to each of my Daughters one hundred Pound, to be equally divided among all my Children to them and their heirs forever, and Lastly I appoint my Son Thomas Spencer and my friend Williamson Bonner as Executors to this my last Will and Testament; making void all former Wills by me made In witness whereof I do hereby set my Hand and affix my seal this Sixth Day of October A.D. One Thousand Eight Hundred and Six.
