Will and desire that my Executors should purchase a tract of Land
of Ten or eight Hundred Acres value which Land when
purchased I give to my wife during her life and after her
Death to be equally divided between my two sons and it is my
further desire that my Executors shall furnish the said plantation
with a sufficient quantity of Corn and pork and necessary work-
ing Utensils for the support of my Wife and her family for the
first Year of settling the said Land and the said Land is to be
purchased where my Wife chooses and all the above property as

part of among the said land and the said land is to be

above disposed of is to be in lieu of dower Item I give
to my beloved wife my bay Horse butler Chair and Harness
Item It is my desire that the profits of the Mill shall be
equally divided between my two sons and wife until my son
William arrives to the age of twenty one Item It is my Will
and desire that my Lands and Mill shall be equally divided
between my two sons John D McIn and William W McIn my
son Jack taking the new House and my son William the House
that I now live in and that all the residue of my Estate shall
be equally divided between my sons Item It is my Will and
desire that my Negroes shall be equally divided between my
two sons my son Jack D McIn bringing those into the
division that I have heretofore gave him and the said division
to take place as soon as the crop is finished Item I give to
my wife, Milley as long as she continues to live on the plantation
that I now live on Item It is my Will and desire that my
wife should continue to reside on the plantation that I now

Executors therein named refusing to qualify as such On the Motion
of John D. McLin and Joseph Wilkins (two of the said Executors)

tion on the said Testator's Estate with the Will annexed in
due form, they having made Oath thereto according to Law,
and acknowledged Bond with approved Security, conditioned, as
the Law directs.
