

Dec. 6th 1865

I Elizabeth B. Clarke of the County of Hanover and State of Virginia, being of sound mind and disposing memory do make and ordain this to be my last will and testament.

1st I wish all my just debts to be paid.

2^d My wish and desire is that my man Tom may be free as under the will of my late husband Wilson B. Clarke and receive out of my estate the sum of one hundred dollars and be permitted to remain in the Commonwealth of Virginia with his family and that N. B. Clarke will act as Master for him.

3^d I give and bequeath the ~~one~~ half of my entire Estate to the Heirs and Heirs of my late husband Wilson B. Clarke in manner and form as follows to wit: Except to Maria Luck and her son William Louis Luck, I having secured and settled on her during her life and after her death to her said son a house and lot on the lots of Richmond or County of Henrico To Elizabeth B. Clarke an amount making her equal with the balance hereafter named including at fair valuation the tract of land I have deeded to her called ~~and~~ known as Purvis 20. acres in which William H. Timberlake is trustee whatever amount should be coming to her after deducting the value of said tract of land. The residue of this half of my Estate I wish and direct to be equally divided per capita between my said husband and N. B. Clarke.

nephews as follows To wit "To N. B. Clarke, J. W. Clarke, N. B.
Stark, S. A. Clarke, Ann M. Turner, Mr. E. Dickerson, W. H.
Timberlake, A. R. Timberlake, J. L. Timberlake, Lebus Timberlake
Wilson Timberlake, Angelina Martin, Lirona Hutchinson, Charles
Mason dec'd & the children of Ellen Mason dec'd their mother's
share. Also the S. Clarke and William Clarke, that portion of
my estate allotted to J. W. Clarke, I give and bequeath to W.
B. Clarke, in trust for the sole and separate use and main-
tenance of the said J. W. Clarke not subject to any indebtedness
of the said J. W. Clarke (and at his death the said part allotted
to him is to belong in fee simple to N. B. Clarke or his heirs
should the said J. W. Clarke be indebted to the said N. B.
Clarke the amount of his share that portion allotted to Ellen
Mason dec'd I bequeath to J. L. Timberlake in trust for the sole
and separate use and benefit of his said sister's children
My wish and desire is that the sum of two hundred
dollars be taken from each of the shares of A. R. Timber-
lake, J. L. Timberlake, Lebus Timberlake (and William
Timberlake and bestowed upon the children of Ellen
Mason dec'd.

4. The other half and residue of my Estate I give and bequeath
in the following manner to wit "To my half brothers and Sisters
To George Channing I give one third, To Rubin Channing one fifth, To
Mildred Rice one third, To Adeline Stark, To Benjamin Channing

To Maria Cheving each to receive one fifth as much as
my whole blood brothers and sisters. The residue of this half
of my estate I give and bequeath to my brothers and sisters
and their descendants of the whole blood to be equally divided
between them to wit: Albert G. Cheving, James D. Cheving,
Robert D. Cheving, Francis B. Cheving, Melinda Valentine
Marcella Jackson and the children of my youngest son
D. Johnson Decd that part allotted to her children I wish to
be equally divided between the children of John Johnson (Jr)
viz Mary L. Johnson Ann E. Johnson D. Newton and
William Leary Johnson. I do this on account of Mary L.
Johnson's kindness to her younger sister and brothers. The share allotted
to my brother Robert D. Cheving I give and bequeath to my brother
F. B. Cheving in trust for the use and maintenance of my said
brother Robert during his life, not being subject to the control
of his creditors or subject to sale for any of his debts and
after his death to his legal heirs or children and it is my intention
that the amount that I have paid and am to pay for the land which
I bought of my said brother Robert shall constitute a part of his
portion of my estate and the share allotted to my brother Francis
B. Cheving, I give and bequeath in trust to George Cheving
for the maintenance and support of my said brother Francis
without being subject to the control of his creditors or subject
to sale for his debts and I do moreover authorize his trustee

without being subject to the control of his creditors or subject
to sale for his debts, and I do moreover authorize his trustee
to pay over to my said brother Francis B. at any time any sum of
money that he may need for his maintenance ~~and~~ comfort
without being liable for the same and at the death of my said
brother should any portion remain of principal or interest I wish
it to be equally divided between his Children.

5th Should my land remain unsold until after my death I direct
that my Executors sell it and divide the proceeds agreeable to this my
will. It is my wish and desire that my Executors shall not sell my
State bonds and Richmond City stock agreeable to the provisions
of this my will, it being my desire to divide said Bonds & Stock
to James D. Lehmann and Sallie his wife. I give a bond of one hundred
dollar separate from all the rest. I also wish my brother James &
family to remain here until the farm is sold. I give to my
sister Mrs. C. Valentine my portrait and that of my husband.

6th Lastly I do hereby constitute and appoint N. B. Clarke and
John N. Valentine Executors to this my last will and testament
distinctly directing that they shall not be required to give security
and they are to have what will be a full compensation for
settling up my Estate without any additional commission or
compensation. In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand

Channing my milk milk, two thirds of the corn, and all the firewood and position hand at my death and two barrels of flour and all of the furniture in the room he is now occupying and that he shall retain possession of said room till the farm is sold should he desire it,

To Wella Channing, son of Gebalon Channing I bequeath three pigs to Sissy H. Channing my Lemon Bunch and to Fannie E. Channing the rest of the flowers or such as she may wish and to my friend Mrs Satterwhite my Kerosene Lamp and to Betty Turner one of my Fruit Baskets.

To Harrison and Nettle (colored) one third of the corn, three bushels of wheat and two gallons of Molasses. Nettle and Jane to have a calico dress apiece and all the Children to be well clothed.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this eleventh day of December eight hundred and sixty five.
