ty and State named above, all my estate, real, personal and
Chattel and every other possession and interest I now have or
may have at my death, to be equally divided among them
Second. - I will that at the death of any of the three parties

named by me above; his or her part of the property and other interest derived from me by this will shall pass to the Survivors of the brother and Sisters named, to be held or disposed of by them as they may choose.

Third. I will that at my death, my brother and Sisters herein named, carry this will into execution, and that the Court shall not in that case require any security of them.
