

Henrico County April Court 1715

In the name of God Omnipotent I Henry Cocke of this County and parish of Henrico in Virginia being at present in great indisposition of body but by the blessing of God in perfect memory and judgment do make this my last will and Testament in the manner following hereby revoking all former wills by me made.

I call I beseech my soul unto Christ my Saviour by whose merits and mediation I hope for the forgiveness of my sins and everlasting life.

And as to my worldly goods I give them in manner following vizt  
I give unto my loving Brother James powell Cocke all my tract of Land lying on the white oak swamp consisting of nine hundred and forty acres to him and his heirs forever.

Item. I give to my loving Brother Brasfield Cocke the plantation which was left to me by my Brother Thomas Cocke containing five hundred acres lying a mile to the white Oak swamp to him and his heirs forever.

Item. I give to my loving Sister Elizabeth Cocke my plantation lying upon Maulburn hill to her and her heirs forever.

Item I give unto my loving Sister Mary Fenny my Negro woman called my Negro girl Tomp together with my Negro girl that was born at M<sup>r</sup> Richard Cocke's about four year old with their Jurys to her and her heirs forever.

Item. I give to my Sister Elizabeth my Negro woman named Jenny and my Negro girl named Judith with their Jurys to her & her heirs forever.

Item. I will direct of my Estate of what kind soever I give to be equally divided between my two Brothers James Powell Cocke and Brasfield Cocke excepting my coat suit of Leather which I hereby give to my younger Brother Brasfield Cocke, in consideration then when I was last in Virginia I left several things to my Brother James which I hereby give to him to be no longer considered as any part of my Estate.

Lastly I appoint my loving Brothers M<sup>r</sup> William Fenny and James Powell Cocke joyful Executors of this my last will and Testament. In witness whereof I have Signed Sealed and published this my last will and Testament on board the shipp Harrison now bound for Virginia this first day of Feb<sup>r</sup>y.

four year old with their Jursoas to her and her heirs forever.

Item. I give to my Sister Elizabeth my Negro w<sup>m</sup>an named Longy and my Negro  
girl named Judith with their Jursoas to her & her heirs forever.


Item. — All the rest of my Estate of what kind soever I give to be equally divided  
between my two Brothers James Powell Cooke and Brassard Cooke excepting  
my last suit of Cloathes which I hereby give to my younger Brother Brassard  
Cooke, in consideration that when I was last in Virginia I left several things  
to my Brother James which I hereby give to him to be no longer considered  
as any part of my Estate.

In the even<sup>n</sup> of God<sup>e</sup> I leave the sixteenth day of March in the year of our Lord  
one thousand seven hundred and fifteen and in the first year of the Reign of our  
Sovereign Lord King George I Benjamin Watson of the parish and County of  
Henrico being sick and weak in body but of good and perfect memory present  
to the Almighty God I do constitute make and Ordaine this my last will  
and Testament in manner and forme following.

I Command my Soul into the hands of Almighty God my Creator & Redemer  
my Body to the Ground from whence it came to be buried in a decent manner  
at the discretion of my Executrix hereafter mentioned.

Item I give and bequeath unto my Son John Watson my Plantation called  
Lewis Orange now lying with fifty five acres of Land to him and his  
Heirs of his Body forever for want of such Cars to return to his Sister  
Judith and after Lewis Orange shall come to his vire he comes of ago my  
desire his that he may have it in full possession at the age of eighteene.
