

four and this hundred acres above mentioned to and for him and his heirs for ever and to enjoy the same after the Decease of my wife the said hundred acres to be taken from the North line going up to the South then I declare and do bequeath by this my will one plantation lying and being situate on the great branch of the Manocking upper Creek containing four hundred acres with all the appurtenances thereto belonging unto my son Isaac Dutoit to him and his heirs for ever then I do declare and bequeath unto my daughter in law James Shobrieff one Cow and Calf and a sow then I declare by this my will and do bequeath five Cows unto my eldest Daughter Elizabeth Dutoit when she is married and likewise the same unto my youngest Daughter Mary Ann Dutoit when she be married; then I do declare by this my will and Testament that all the negroes and moveable Estate belonging to me to be divided in ^{equal} portion unto my above named Children Elizabeth Dutoit Mary Ann Dutoit and Isaac Dutoit after the Decease of my well beloved wife; then I do hereby ordain my dear and well beloved wife to be executrix of this my will declaring that this is my last will and Testament which I will have executed after my Death and to be punctually executed after my Death Denouncing all Laws and Maxims which should come to the contrary of this my will in witness whereof I have hereunto affixed my hand & seal in presence of witnesses In Manockin Town King William parish this 2. day of May Anno Domini: 1726.
