 to be paid by my Executrix from thence to my Daughter Domicant one Shilling from thence to my Daughter Anne
 Spranger one Shilling from thence to my Daughter Anne one Shilling from thence to my son William Andrews one Shilling
 from thence to my son John the plantation where he now lives with the goods and chattels belonging
 to the same to him the said John Andrews his Heirs and Assignes for ever and so hereby this will is made in full
 and appoint my said Benjamin Andrews my full whole and sole Executrix of this my last will and Testament in
 whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this day and year first above written.

 requires a Certificate for obtaining a probate thereof in due form was granted him by the Court. And the same
 is entered in the records of the County for the same.

 bequeath unto my son Richard and John Willson all the Land whereon I now live to be equally divided between them
 and for them and there Heirs and Assignes for ever. Item I give and bequeir unto my Daughter Mathew one bed and
 furniture belonging to it. Item I give and bequeir to my son George one bed and furniture. Item I give unto my son William one
 bed and forriner and for all the rest of my Estate I desire may be sold and my debts paid out of it and out of the remainder
 I Order my Daughter Sarah to have four pounds to be paid by my Brother George and the rest if there be any left I desire may be
 equally divided between all my Children. And I do make my loving Brother George Willson my sole Ex^r of this my last Will
 and Testament this being my true intent and meaning revoking all other Wills whatsoever in Witness whereof I have hereunto
 set my hand and seal this 14 day of March 1731/2.
