 the mortality of my Body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die do make and contain this my
 last Will and Testament that is to say first I give and recommend my Soul into the hands of god that gave it to
 me my Body I recommend it to the Earth to be buried in a Christian like and decent manner at the discretion of my
 Executors nothing enabling but at the general Resurrection to receive the same again by the mighty power of God
 and as touching such worldly goods as it hath pleased God to bless me in this life I give and dispose of the same in
 manner and form following viz: I give and bequeath unto my Daughter Lucy Parker two hundred
 Acres of Land called pattons joining to Colonel Bird and Benjamin Horner I give to her and her heirs forever
 I give unto George Keince and his for himself my land and Seal the Day and year above Written
 Signed Sealed Delivered in the presence of us Peter Varnier. Benj. BA. Moore. John T. Blankenship. Mich.

 John Blankenship two of the Witnesses thereto, and was thereupon admitted to record.

I being in perfect memory and understanding do in the first place Will and Bequeath my Soul and Body to god that
 gave it and do dispose of my worldly goods as followeth This being my last will and Testament I will and bequeath to my
 daughter Mary Dupuis wife of Francis Dupuis one hundred acres of land joining Sillagers and lying between first
 corner Tree and the Creek for bounds to her during life and after her decease to Peter Dupuis and his heirs forever
 I likewise will and bequeath the rest of the Land with the plantation to my dearer loved son John Dupray during
 up and after her decease to my well beloved Brother and his heirs forever I likewise will and bequeath to my
 Wife a Negro Woman during life and after her decease to my Daughter Mary Dupuis with her Child
 she now goes with the rest of her increase to belong to my Wife from this time and to be at her own
 disposal her whole personal Estate with Negroes Chattels Trusses and Lands to be my Wives during life
 and after her decease I give to my Brother Lewis Dupray I give to him and four more Negroes
 I have given to my Wife and child James to Peter Parker in all one Negro called Charles to Moses Parker in
 after my Wives decease and my moveable Estate after my Wives decease to be equally divided as if Negroes this being
 this being my last Will and Testament I sign and Seal it in the presence of us... (Seal)

In the name of God Amen The fourteenth day of Decemr one thousand seven hundred and thirty four
 I John Thos of the parish and County of Henrico being Weak of Body but of Sound and perfect memory do make
 this my last Will and Testament in manner and form following hereby revoking and making void all other Wills
 or Testaments by me formerly made and that none other but this be held or taken for my last Will or Testament
 I give my Soul to god that gave it me, I fully Trusting in his mercy and the merits of Jesus Christ my Saviour
 that I shall receive pardon for all my sins and a joyful Resurrection at the last Day and my Body to be disposed
 of as shall seem good to my Executors hereafter named and for my worldly Estate I dispose of the same as followeth
 I give unto my wife Daughters Martha Thos and Charles Thos
