Samuel Gathright's Will } In the name of God amen, I Samuel Gathright of Henrico
County being in perfect senses and sound memory do constitute, ordain and appoint
this as my last Will and Testament in manner and form as followeth:

Item, I give and bequeath unto my son John Gathright four slaves, named Dion, Simon, Biddy and Hannah, to him and his heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath unto my son William Gathright two hundred and sixty five acres of land be the same more or less heretofore marked out by self; also four slaves named Charles, Joe, Claiborn and Man to him and his heirs forever. Item, I give and bequeath unto my son Benjamin Gathright two hundred acres of land including the manor Plantation; also six slaves named Will, Anthony, Dico, Nat, Moll and Dorcas, one Bed and furniture one horse, four head of cattle, all which I give unto my said son to him and his heirs forever; Provided, he gives the free privilege of his sister Agnes Gathright living with him during her life or single state. I also give unto Benjamin Gathright my family Bible unto him and his heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath unto my son Thomas Gathright three hundred acres of land being part of the land Snowline on, the bounds to be ascertained by line beginning on deep run, and running between my Dwelling house and the kitchen, and so on till the quantity is obtained; also four slaves named Jacob, Martin, Cemoj and Hannah, one Bed and furniture, one horse, four head of cattle, to him and his heirs forever.

Item, I do hereby and my will is such, lend unto my daughter Frances Carter four slaves during her natural life, named Sarah, Wynny, Lydia and Paul, and the slaves so lent to be equally divided between the Children of my said daughter Frances at her death to them and their heirs forever; also five shillings to her and her heirs forever.

Pursuant to the abovementioned order of Henrico Court dated January 1791, we have again taken up the accounts of Mr. Catharine Matthews as administratrix of Edward Bark dec^d and it appears to us that in addition to the above balances of seven hundred and sixty six pounds fourteen shillings and ten pence, with interest thereon from the twenty third of February 1791, the additional sum of Eighty nine pounds thirteen shillings and six pence three farthings is found due from the Estate of the said Edward Bark dec^d to Jonathan Bark for which the said Administratrix is liable, as appears by a Statement and award of Arbitrators chosen mutually for that purpose, with interest thereon from October One thousand seven hundred and eighty three.

We are informed also by Colonel Matthews who acts for the Administratrix, that there is yet a balance due from the Estate on account of the maintenance and education of Edward Bark Orphan of Edward Bark dec^d, which, it is not yet in his power to ascertain, and which for that reason, we have subjoined at the foot of the within account and left blank. We are informed also, that exclusive of the negroes which were temporarily divided before the accounts came under our inspection, and of which no account has been exhibited to us, there are bonds due to the said Estate as of list subjoined to the credit side of the within account, the collection of which except so much of those due from Jonathan Bark, as will balance the award of the Arbitrators in his favor is extremely doubtful. We are also shown a considerable number of claims in favor of the said Estate on upon accounts, which from their long standing, and therefore being ^{all} barred by the Act of Limitations, little or nothing is to be expected.
