 and under the same restrictions together with one feather Bed to her & her
 heirs forever. Item, I give and bequeath to my daughter Anna Glenn
 One feather ^{bed} and furniture together with a Cow and Calf to be delivered her
 when she arrives to lawful age or marries to her and her heirs forever.

Item, I give and bequeath to the Orphan boy Robert Slaw, now living
 with me, provided he attains to the age of twenty one years, a Cow & Calf to
 be delivered him when he arrives to the aforesaid age, to him and his heirs
