life the Tract of Land in Chesterfield County called and known by the name of  
Kingsland which I purchased of Christopher Branch together with all the Stock  
of Horses Cattle and Sheep together with all the Plantation Utensils thereon (also four  
hundred Acres of Land more or less in the County of Henrico whereon I now live  
to begin at the lower end of the fishing sweep, from thence a straight line to a red  
Oak it being a corner on Colpton and Burton's line from thence the said line  
to Bullington's line from thence along the said line to the land belonging to  
Henry Cox and thence along the said line to the River thence up the river to  
the beginning likewise the Houses and furniture wherein and thereto belonging  
I am I give and bequeath unto my said Wife Tabitha Randolph all and singular  
the slaves and other property which I acquired by my Intercourse with her

to her and her Heirs forever all of which I give her in lieu of her Dower  
 Item. I give and bequeath to my son Edward Cox all my lands in Henrico County including  
 the lands which I have given to my Wife during my life to him and his Heirs forever together  
 with all my Household and Kitchen furniture therewith belonging together with all the residue  
 of my Estate. But it is my Will and desire if my wife be with Child at the time of my death and  
 it should be a Son I give and bequeath unto him the land and plantation which I own in  
 Chesterfield County known by the name of Kingsland and a certain tract of land known  
 by the name of the Wair likewise one half of my personal Estate to him and his Heirs forever  
 But if in Case it should be a Daughter I give and bequeath to her the tract of Land called  
 and known by the name of Kingsland to her and her Heirs forever likewise one half  
 of my personal Estate. But in Case my said Son Edward should not arrive to lawful  
 age or marry then and in that Case I give and bequeath unto John Friend a  
 tract of land known by the name of Kingsland and the tract of land known by the Wair  
 to him and his Heirs forever. And likewise in the same manner I give and bequeath  
 unto Henry Cox the land in Henrico County which I lent to my Wife to him and his  
 Heirs forever. And likewise in the same manner I give and bequeath unto George Cox all  
 the remainder of my Lands including the old plantation to him and his Heirs forever.  
 Likewise my Will and desire is that if either of the above circumstances should take  
 place viz My Son Edward Cox dying and my Wife not being with Child to arrive of  
 lawful age then and in that Case I give devise and bequeath all my personal Estate  
 of every description to be equally divided between George Cox, Henry Cox and John  
 Friend to them and their Heirs forever. Item I give and bequeath unto my friend  
 Joseph Friend five hundred pounds current money to be raised out of my Estate  
 by my Executors hereafter named to him and his Heirs forever provided he  
 qualifies as one of my Executors. And lastly I do nominate Constitute and appoint  
 George Cox, Joseph Friend, John Friend and Henry Cox my Executors to this my last  
 Will and Testament. In witness whereof I have this ninth day of May One thousand  
 seven hundred and ninety eight set my hand and seal revoking all other Wills  
 made heretofore by me and acknowledging this alone to be my last Will and  
 Testament

At a Court held for Henrico County at the Courthouse on Monday the fourth day of June 1792.  
This Will and the Codicil thereto annexed were proved by the Oaths of Thomas A Taylor,  
and Robert Williamson witnesses thereto and Ordained to be recorded John Friend one of  
the executors in the said Will named personally appeared in Court and renounced the  
Execution thereof. And on the Motion of George Cox and Joseph Friend two other  
Executors named in the said Will who made oath thereto according to Law and  
together with Edward Friend senior, Edward Friend junior, Thomas A Taylor and  
John Friend their securities entered into and acknowledged their Bond in the penalty  
of ten thousand pounds conditioned as the Law directs Certificate is granted them  
for obtaining a probate thereof in due form. Above being reserved to Henry Cox the  
other executor named in the said Will to join in the probate aforesaid when he shall  
think fit.

The Certificate of admittance to bonds more with the will of James Britain of the  
annexed granted Edward Cox, recorded in this book page 641.

James Brittain In the Name of GOD Amen I James Brittain of the parish and County of  
Henrico being in perfect sense and memory thanks be to Almighty God but calling to  
mind the frailty and uncertainty of this life do constitute and Ordain this as my  
last Will and Testament in manner and form following First and principally I give  
and commit my soul into the hands of my merciful Creator hoping for remission of  
my sins through the merits of my blessed Redeemer Jesus Christ My body I  
bequeath be buried at the discretion of my Executors hereafter named and as to all Worldly  
goods and Estate it hath pleased God to bless me with I give and bequeath thereof  
in manner following Imprimis I give and bequeath to my son Samuel Brittain the  
one hundred Acres of land taken up by me adjoining the tract of Land now known  
as the lands of Peter Winston deceased, James Royal, Thomas Wood and Aaron  
Lucas to him my said son and his Heirs forever upon those express terms that my  
said son Samuel permit his two sisters Sarah Brittain and Louise Brittain either  
of them to get what timber they may want from off the said piece or tract of land  
so devised my said Son I also give and bequeath to my said Son Samuel at my death  
a negro man named Benjamin to him and his Heirs forever together with a gun  
which gun is now in my said Sons possession Item I give and bequeath to my  
Daughter Lucy Royal provided she lives to have issue of her body begotten the

following Slaves Viz Charles and Lucy together with a Horse and saddle, feather bed and furniture  
 also painted Chest four Chairs six pewter plates one Pewter Dish and ten quenches China after  
 all of which are now in the possession of her Husband James Royall. I also give unto my  
 said Daughter Lucy upon the aforesaid conditions at my death the following negroes, to wit  
 Nell and her son Park together with all the future Increase of the said Nell and the  
 above mentioned Lucy another feather Bed and furniture, two Cows and Calves, my former  
 black Walnut Cupboard standing in the Hall and my Case with eleven Bottlets to her as  
 her Heirs forever, provided she has issue as aforesaid. Nevertheless my Will is that my  
 said Daughter Lucy be permitted to hold the aforesaid property during her natural life and  
 profits arising from the same to be applied in any manner my said Daughter Lucy Royall  
 may think proper. And if my said Daughter Lucy should die without having Issue as  
 aforesaid, my Will is that such part of my Estate as is given my Daughter as aforesaid be  
 equally divided between her surviving sisters or sister or their legal representatives to  
 them and their Heirs forever. Item I give and bequeath to my Daughter Sarah  
 Britain under the same restrictions I gave my daughter Lucy Royall the property so  
 devised my said Daughter Lucy as aforesaid the following negroes Viz. John, Will  
 Charlotte and Beck together with their future Increase also two feather beds and furniture  
 a Horse and saddle, my large black Walnut Table standing in the Hall also painted  
 Chest to her and her Heirs forever provided she hath Issue as aforesaid. Nevertheless  
 my Will and desire is that my said Daughter be permitted to hold the said property during  
 her natural life and the profits arising from the same to be applied in any manner  
 my said Daughter may think proper. And if my said Daughter Sarah should die without  
 having issue as aforesaid my Will is that such part of my Estate as is devised my Daughter  
 aforesaid be equally divided between her surviving sisters or sister or their legal representa-  
 tives to them and their Heirs forever. Item I give and bequeath to my Daughter Louisa  
 Britain (under the same restrictions of her aforesaid sisters) the following negroes  
 Will, Monmouth, Alice, Sarah and Aaron together with their future Increase, one Horse  
 and saddle, two feather Beds and Furniture black Walnut Desk and looking glass  
 small black Walnut Table to her and her Heirs forever provided she hath Issue as  
 aforesaid. Nevertheless my Will is that my said Daughter Louisa be permitted to hold  
 the said property during her natural life and the profits arising from the same to be  
 applied in any manner my said Daughter may think proper. And if my said  
 Daughter Louisa should die without having Issue as aforesaid my Will is that no  
 part of my Estate so devised my Daughter aforesaid be equally divided between her surviving  
 sisters or sister or their legal representatives to them and their Heirs forever.

I also leave to my said Daughter Louisa my negro boy Nealon aged nine years last September until he arrives to the age of twenty five years at which time if my son Samuel Britain should be living I then bequeath the remainder of the said boy Nealon to my said Son Samuel to him and his Heirs forever, but if my said Son should not be living at the aforesaid time I then bequeath the said boy Nealon to my said Daughter Louisa to her and her Heirs forever Item I give and bequeath to my son Samuel Britain One Shilling Sterling Item I give and bequeath to my grand daughter Sally Garbright Branch a negro girl named Nancy now in the possession of her Father Daniel Branch the said Negro Nancy being the Increase of a negro by the name of Sue left by me to my Daughter Mary in her lifetime, which said Negro Nancy I give to my aforesaid Grand Daughter together with her future Increase to her and her Heirs forever Lastly my Will and desire is that the remainder of my Estate not herein disposed of may be equally divided between my two daughters Sarah and Louisa to them and their Heirs forever Lastly I do hereby constitute my son Samuel Britain together with my Friends Roger Gregory junior Nathaniel Wilkinson and Anderson Britain Executors of this my Will hereby revoking all former Wills by me made heretofore declaring this only to be my last Will and Testament In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this fourth day of December One thousand seven hundred and ninety.
