

Also upwards of one hundred Bushels of Wheat on the hands of Miles Hughes which he is to pay for the first day of March next also forty two pounds lent to Ezekiel Perkins to be divided in the same manner as also any other small Debts for which Accounts will be found in my pocket book and in other places in the House. Thereby appoint my friend Ezekiel Perkins Daniel Ellis and Joseph Ellis Executors to this my Last Will and Testament. The Household furniture is also to be equally divided as before mentioned signed sealed and executed this twenty third day of November in the year 1799 in presence of
