that my children may, at the disposal of their own will.

... my estate may not be appraised. It is my will that
all the rest of my estate, undeposited of in this will of what
I have be equally divided among all my children after
my debts are paid. I hereby do appoint Samuel Boone
John Littlejohn, and my son John Littlejohn, Executors of
this my last Will & Testament, making all other Wills and
Testaments made by me void. I have here the 10th day of
April 1777.
