

In the name of God Amen the 11 day of February 1633 James Sampson beinge sick in body but of good and perfect memory thanks be to almighty god, Callinge to remembrance the transitory estate of this transitory life and that all flesh must yeeld unto death when it shall please God to call soe make this Confession and make it knowne this my last Will and Testament in maner and forme followinge made, writinge and by this presents adullinge all former Will or Wills by me formerly made or declared either by word or writinge, doeinge this to be my last Will and Testament and no other: I first beinge penitent and sorry from the bottome of my heart: for my sins past most humbly desiringe forgiveness of the same: Remitt my soule unto Almighty God my saviour and redeemer in whom only the meritts of Jesus Christ I trust and believe: desiringe to be saved thro his hailefull redemption and forgiveness of all my sins: and that my soule with my Body at the generall day of resurrection shall rise againe with joy through the meritts of Christ shall be passionth possessor in the Kingdom of heaven prepared for his elect and chosen: and my Body to be buried in such decent and Christian maner as to my Executor hereafter named shall be thought meett

I first doe give to my daughter Margaret the wife of Nicholas Wilson one Silver Boule and two Silver Cups one with a foote the other with a bulge and three Silver spoons: and two Silver Cups one with a foote the other with a bulge and three Silver spoons: with rubs at the ends and two pounds sterlinge to buy her a Silver Casket and one Silver Casket with water baby gowne two fine holland pillowcases: with damask one piece of stuffe striped with blue a round blacke scarffe with a flanders lace: and my best bed with blankets sheet and coverlet and my best chest and cabinet: my horse and mane and belly if it is my Will that if my daughter Margaret should dye without child or children that what plate I have given to her may returne to my other daughter I doe give unto my some mlaw Nicholas Wilson my best new Coat and a blacke sash and half my pewter: and one goulden ringe to his wife: I doe give him three of the outsidest stiers, and the half of my hoggs: and four of the best doe sties in the house: and a payre of Buckskin shoes and silver Buckles in them: I doe give unto Mr George Moore my red sash to his wife a fine payre of Cotton stockings, my Cattle and other things, as pewter house hold stuffe and hoggs it is my Will shall be Equally divided betwene my some James and my daughter Blacke

I doe give unto my daughter Blacke a large and small dram cup: two Silver spoons the one with a foote the other plain, two Calico pillowcases a piece of stuffe with large yellow stripes and one Bids: I doe give unto my some James, my wearinge ringe: and one Silver spoon: all my clothes in my house: and all my wearinge apparell: and the second best bed in my house with its furniture: and four doe sties: and the Cart and wheels, that Richard Lewis is now makinge: I doe give to my some Wilson 2 flitches of Bacon to my some James two flitches of Bacon: to my daughter Blacke two flitches of Bacon: my some Wilson to have the first choice: I doe give unto John Brown a breedinge sow: my new cloth Breeches: I doe give unto my some Wilson what new rables there be: I doe give betwene my some Wilson and my some James, my sea chest with all my tools: saws: stools: axes and other humbles nominatinge Constitutinge and appointinge my lovinge friends: and neighbours: William Evans Executor of this my last Will and Testament requestinge him to see the same duly performed in Witness whereof I have here unto putt my hand and seale the day & yeare above written James Sampson to be his last Will and Testament in presence of us
