

In the Name of God Amen the 29th Day of March in the Year of our Lord God 1676 I Giles Driscoll being sick
weak in body yet in perfect memory thank's be to God for what this my last Will and Testament in a
mann'r and form following, that is to say first I bequeath my Soule and Spirit into the hands of Almighty
God my Heavenly Father, by whom of his Mercy and only Grace I hope to be saved and retained into
Eternall Rest, my body in hope of a joyful Resurrection, I commit to the Earth to be buried with such
charge and in such place as my dear wife shall thinke good as touching the Distribution of my worldly
goods I bequeath of the same as followeth

I give unto my Sonne Robert Driscoll one hundred Acres of Land and the upper End of the great
Tract hee to buye upon Mr. Robert Coleman for him and his Heires for ever

I bequeath unto my Sonne Charles and Giles Driscoll at my Land on the South Side of the Bay of Virginia (excepting
the Hundred Acres that I gave to my Sonne Robt.) to be Equally divided betwixt them and to be
continued for them the 2. Charles and Giles and their Heires for ever (excepting the two hundred Acres that
will stand on and that to continue at my dear wife's disposal, during her life) and then to be
Divided into my 2. Sons Charles and Giles and their Heires, and if either of them two Charles or
Giles should dye before the Division, or after without Issue then the whole to fall to the Survivour

I do give unto my Sonne John Driscoll that Hundred Acres of Land wch now Robert Savage (wch he
for him and his Heires for ever, and Eight Barrells of Corn to be paid yearly out of the profit of the
two Mills wch are on the River of the York during the 2. John Driscoll's own life

I do will that the profits of my two Mills for the future be Equally divided betwixt my wife and my
two Sonne Charles and Giles and they Equally allowing for Ware and Care, paying unto my Sonne John Eight
Barrells of Indian Corn yearly, and if my wife should dye then the Mills to be let out unto my
two Sonne Charles and Giles they allowing unto their Brother John as before mentioned yearly
and if either of them Charles or Giles should dye then John to Survive

I do give unto my Daughter Hardy Eight thousand pounds of Tobacco to be paid at three paym'ts
after the Day of her Marriag, when my wife shall see fit,

I do make my dear and Lovinglye wife whole Executrix of all the rest of my Mortall good, Immovable
or Immovable, and for her my dear wife to chuse what person or persons she shall thinke convenient
to assist her to see this my last Will and Testament performed according to my hand and Seal this
29th of the month 1676

I John Driscoll of the County of the Shire of Wight Virginia being sick and weak
in body yet of good sound perfect mind and memory thank's and praise be given to Almighty God, yet Driscoll
to leave the portion of my worldly goods which the Lord hath bene pleased to bestow upon me with all the fruits of my
travell or Enterprise that might arise or happen amongst my friends and Acquaintance after my Death
Lemah and Delore this my last Will and Testament in maner and form following, that is to say
first and principally I bequeath my Soule into the hands of Almighty God my maker hoping assuredly
through the merit of alone and all sufficient Merits of his dear Sonne Jesus Christ my only Saviour &
Redemptor for full Remission, Pardon and forgiveness of all my sinnes, my body to the Earth from whence it
came to be buried according to the Discretion of my Executrix hereunder named, and as for all the rest
of my worldly goods wch the Lord hath bene pleased to bestow upon me with all I give devise and bequeath unto
Euseb Down and being wife of Margett Allen all and every my whole stock of Cattle and Swine of what kind
sorter, with one mare wch is all my corne of what sort or graine sorter and all other my house hold goods more
able and Immovable, I bequeath, Intrust from the 2. Cattle and Swine and to her assigne and assigne for ever
Provided always and my will and mind is that my afore said Margett Allen shall give my
Decease unto the Sonne Wilson Daughter of Sam Wilson, one Cow called which she travailed for a Cattle, and also
to John Harbottle Sonne of John Harbottle the 2. my God Sonne the second foale of the increase of the afore
said mare, if she doth with and bring forth foale, Provided the 2. John Harbottle doth live with my wife until he come
of the age of 18 years of age and for all the rest of my worldly goods Immovable and Immovable my Decease
I bequeath, I bequeath being first paid and discharged by me and bequeath the same unto my Loving wife Margett Allen
whom I do nominate and appoint to be my full and sole Executrix of this my last Will and Testament In witness
whereof I have hereunto set my hand and Seal this 29th Day and 30th about the 1676
