

In the Name of God Amen the 1st of June in the 16th Year of our Lord God 1676 I Giles Driscoll being sick
weak in body yet in perfect memory thank's be to God for what this my last Will and Testament in a
manner and form following, That is to say first I bequeath my Soul and Spirit into the hands of Almighty
God my Heavenly Father, by whom of his Mercy and only Grace I hope to be saved and redeemed into
Eternal Rest, my body in hope of a joyful Resurrection I commit to the Earth to be buried with such
charge and in such place as my dear wife shall think good as touching the Distribution of my Mortall
goods I dispose of the same as followeth
I give with that all my Debt to be truly paid
I do give unto my son Robert Driscoll one hundred Acres of Land and at the upper End of the same
Tract to be begun upon Mr. Robert Coleman for him and his Heirs for Ever
I do give unto my son Charles and Giles Driscoll at my Land on the South Side of the Cypress (excepting
the Hundred Acres that I gave to my son Robt.) to be Equally divided betwixt them and to be
continued for them the 2^d Charles & Giles and their Heirs for Ever (excepting the two hundred Acres that
will stand on and that to continue at my then wife's disposal during her life) and then to be
divided into my 2^d sons Charles and Giles and their Heirs, and if either of them two Charles
or Giles should dye before the division or after without Issue then the whole to fall to the Survivors
I do give unto my son John Driscoll that Hundred Acres of Land w^{ch} now Robert Savage (lately on)
for him and his Heirs for Ever, and Eight Barrells of Corn to be paid yearly out of the profit of the
two Mills ^{the one on the East side of the River and the other on the West side} during the 2^d John Driscoll's own life
I do will that the profits of my two Mills for the future be Equally divided betwixt my wife and my
two sons Charles & Giles and they Equally allowing for Wear and Care, paying unto my son John Eight
Barrells of Indian Corn yearly, and if my wife should dye then the Mills to be let out unto my
two sons Charles and Giles they allowing unto their Brother John as before mentioned yearly
and if either of them Charles or Giles should dye then John to survive
I do give unto my Daughter Hardy Eight thousand pounds of Tobacco to be paid at Christmas
after the Day of her Marriag^e, when my wife shall see fit,
I do make my dear and Lovinglye wife whole Executrix of all the rest of my Mortall good, Immovable
or Immoveable, and for her my dear wife to chuse what person or persons she shall think convenient
to assist her to do this my last Will and Testament performed as Witness my hand and Seal this
29th of the month 1676

I William Wilson of Warwickshire in the County of the City of Wight Virgin^a being sick and weak
in body yet of good sound perfect mind and memory thank's and praise be to Almighty God, Yet Driscoll
to have the portion of Worldly Estate which the Lord hath bene pleased to bestow upon me with all, for fear of any
trouble or Controversie that might arise or happen amongst my friends and Acquaintance after my Death,
I make and declare this my last Will and Testament in manner and form following That is to say
first and principally I commit my Soul into the hands of Almighty God my maker hoping assuredly
through the good alone and all sufficient Merits of his dear Son Jesus Christ my only Saviour &
Redemptor for full Remission, Pardon and forgiveness of all my sinnes, my body to the Earth to be buried
as I am buried according to the Discretion of my Executrix hereunder named, and as for all the rest
of my Worldly goods as the Lord hath bene pleased to bestow upon me with all I give devise and bequeath unto
my dear and Lovinglye wife Margaret Allen all and every my whole stock of Cattle and Swine of what kind
sorter, with one hundred shillings all my Corn of what sort or grain sorter and all other my house hold goods move
able and Immoveable, I will that I bequeath from the 2^d Cattle and Swine and to her assigned and assigned for Ever
Provided always and my will and mind is that my afore said dear wife Margaret Allen shall give my
dear daughter Anne Wilson Daughter of Sam^l Wilson one Cow Calf which she gave her for a Cattle, and also
to John Harbottle Son of John Harbottle late my God Son the second son of the late increase of the afore
said, if she doth with and bequeath it forth, Provided the 2^d John Harbottle doth live with my wife's life, he com
ing of the age of 18 years or more and for all the rest of my Worldly goods Immoveable and Immoveable my distant
Mortall Estate being first paid and discharged by me and bequeath the same unto my Lovinglye wife Margaret Allen
whom I do nominate and appoint to be my full and sole Executrix of this my last Will and Testament In witness
whereof I have hereunto set my hand and Seal the Day and Year above said 1676
