

In the name of God Amen, I William Clay of the shire of Waight County, beinge very sick & weak in body but in perfect sense & memorye doe here make & ordaine, this my last will & testament, as followeth, first I bequeath my soule to Almighty God, who gave it me; & my body to the earth, from whence it came; through the merits & blood of his deere sonne, Iesus Christ, & my body to be buried in decent Christian buriall, as for my worldly and temporall estate I ordaine in maner & form followinge: I give & bequeath unto Mary, the youngest daughter of Henry Kynally, one porcyger, & a rove ralph. in ras: it be reserved from the widowes; further I doe give to my brother John my boy, that was my fathers, a broad cloth swate, & a pair of best cloth. After my death, & things settled: It is my will, that the first man should, that the widowes may doth bring, that is my Dow, be delivered into my brother John his daughter Elizabeth Clay; Item it is my will, my lands, & downe to my daughter Elizabeth Clay, my wife Judith Clay, havinge her life therin, And as for all my whole estate, as chattell, or hoggs, house hold stuff, or any other thinge belonginge to me: the aforesaid William Clay do be equally divided, betweene my deere wife, Judith Clay, & my deere child, after my death be paid. I do also ordaine that my deere wife, Judith Clay, be my whole executor & Administrato: of this my will to be it executed, as written by my hand & seal, this tenth day of January 1675

I Thomas Gross beinge sick & weak in body but in perfect sense & memorye, I doe make this my last will & testament. In the name of God Amen; Item I will & bequeath my soule to God, who gave it me; & my body to the earth, from whence it came; Item I will & bequeath unto my eldest sonne, William Gross, & to my youngest sonne Francis Gross; a peice of land with I have laid upon on the westward side of the swampe, that runneth by my orchard; firste side: with the house, & orchard belonginge unto it, & them & their heirs for ever; Item I will & bequeath unto my sonne Thomas Gross; a peice of land with litle, on the other side of the swampe unto him & his heirs for ever. And if either of my sonnes die without issue; his part, to be equally divided, the other two; Item I will & bequeath unto my eldest sonne, John Gross, two hundred, of two years old; one black & white & the other red & white one: in the other side of the swampe; Item I will & bequeath unto my youngest sonne, Francis, Grosse, one daughter, Susana Grosse one silver spoon; Item I will & bequeath unto my youngest daughter, Mary Grosse, a good ringe & five pewter dishes, and one pewter basin; Item I give & bequeath unto my deere wife, Susana Grosse the third of my land; for her life, & the rest of my estate, & things settled: I do make my deere wife, my executor & Administrato: to this my last will & testament: as written by my hand this 27. of february 1674
