neath my soul unto god almighty who gave it and kindly my body to the earth
to be buried in decent and Christian like manner and do ordaine this to be my
Last will and Testament in manner and forme as followeth

14 I do give and bequeath unto my wife Louisa some Edward Harris my plantation that
now lies on with all my land belonging to it the same to her and her heirs for
ever also one yoke of draught steers with a Cart belonging unto them also one great
Ewe also one yoke of sheeping Lambs that from wedged one foot and small flying over
sheep and eight ell of sheathing canvas that from wedged one foot and small flying over
also I do give and bequeath unto my wife Louisa some John Harris one great
polt two sweteled dishes one large than the other one large frying pan one iron vessel
two shists one small table & one couch

44 also I do give unto my wife Louisa some Thomas Harris four sweteled dishes and
also I do give unto my wife Louisa some Robert Harris one bed being want off
a flasson two salsters one small iron pot one low one heft of two year old oil
yeartlings heftes

54 also I do give unto my wife Louisa some Robert Harris one bed being want off
and trusses with all the furniture thereto belonging one small gun one
horne to be sold for his use

64 also I do give unto my wife Louisa daughter Jane Jones eight metal drayns
I do give and bequeath unto my wife Louisa daughter Jane Harris one bed
I do give and bequeath unto my wife Louisa other things thereto belonging but in last will did
I newly sepon with the furniture other things thereto belonging but in last will did
I forfet that Cometh of ager or marrieth then the bed with what belongs thereto

I shall fall to my sonne Robert Harris after hiss death by a Cagge & Cagge & Cagge
 one iron pot containing two or three gallons with two or three plates dishes
 but if this dyeth that he and his wife shall have Robert and John Harris
 I alsoe desire that what Cattle is left that is not heret in dispossess may bee sold
 and likewise my stocke of hoggs to bee sold after my death being enough to
 paye debts & menta I doe desire the rest of what cattle I have now growing
 on the plantation if it please god it come to maturity the same to bee sold like
 wise with the cattle and what hoggs may bee left after the debts above said paid
 the same to bee sold to the profitablie best as may bee thought fit by my son
 Edward Harris, being my whole Executor and John Fulgham and John Turner
 they two persons being appointed my executors of this my last Will and Testa
 ment they with my Executor to divide be the part of this said Cattle hoggs and
 wheat to the best advantage for the good of my three youngest sons George Harris
 Martin Harris & William Harris only two which debts to be payed off and one
 iron pot out of the residue to be delivered to Robert Harris and the remainder
 to be equally divided betwixt the said George Harris Martin Harris and William
 Harris, and likewise desire that these three boys left mentioned all Robert Harris
 Harris and Martin Harris to remaine this present year upon the plan
 George Harris and Martin Harris to remaine this present year upon the plan
 takynge and afterward that Robert Harris may dwelle with John Fulgham thre
 years, and George Harris to dwelle with John Turner four years and Martin
 Harris, and George Harris to dwelle with John Turner four years and my sonne
 Harris to remaine with his brother Edward Harris five years and my sonne
 William Harris to live with Bridgeman joyner six years and likewise my
 daughter Anne to live with me about thare fifteen years if shee bee alone
 I shall live no longer

I shall give unto each of my grand children a cowe calfe aperte
 one thing more I bequeath unto each of my grand children a cowe calfe aperte
 to them & innesce of the female. Thus awwing and concluding this to be my last
 Will and Testament and doe reue and confirm my alldowable will and Testament
 from or by me made as witness my hand and seal the fourteenth day of March in
 the year of our lord God 1683
