

Thomas Ogilthorpe very sick of body but in perfect memory I make this my last will and
different as followeth
first I Bequeath my soul to God that gave it me and my Body to the Earth from whence it came
was taken to be Christian like buried
And what Estate it hath pleased God to bestow me withall I do give unto my three daughters -
Catherine, Margaret and Sarah Ogilthorpe after my debts and payds to be equally divided amongst
them also it is my desire that my eldest daughter with her on the plantation provided them
now warr made of any thing; and if it should please god that one or more of my daughters should die
without heir it shall fail to the next living; it is my desire that my daughters enjoy my lands & then
and thine heirs for ever; and in case my daughters all should dy without heirs I do give my lands
unto Richard Thomas his eldest sonne to him and his heires for ever also I do appoint
friends Simon Ewerde and John Ewerde and Richard Thomas to be my executors and do appoynt
my two youngest daughters my whole land & sole Executrix to make this my last Will and Testament
Revolving all other Wills formerly by me made; In witness whereof I have set my hand and seal
the last day of March 1687

The depo^t of John Goodrich aged 37 years or there about saith

That being sent to all ymrs in the Company of Giles Linscott of Dickens Field say that the
longif lnde of Robert Penn and he was to have both their Estates & if Newall Lyons would
ask Giles why he left a Brother a Brother hang him & Giles before he should know any of my
estate should burne it all this distroyed was nott above eight or ten dayes before his death and
Newall Lyons before that and did hang him till Robert Penn what Holland he had to make the
distroye shirts for dayes Giles lay in bed and shall drop away before long; God believe it to
dy first let me haue the one halfe of it and leye the other for thy selfe; and fourth do the like to
the doft by before me for witt will not want Robert as long as witt do live and many worts mor
to this purpose I further sayth nott

The depo^t of Thomas Elms aged 20 years or there about saith

That being in the Company of Giles Linscott about sum eight or ten dayes before his death somtyme
Company was abiding him that his Brother would haue his estate and Giles Linscott understandid me he
shd haue the longif lnde of Robert Penn & I thought that I would burne it all before he should haue any of it forfaw
other wayes & cōveny for the longif lnde of Robert Penn & I do take both our Estates and haue
appointed Holland in my witt to shd both of us & the longif lnde is to see of the other be
hauid with him at the sayth nott as witt do my hand this 19th day of Feby 1688

Linscott did ask me whether Robert Penn had told me of the bargaine that Robert Penn had mad
and if sayd nott yes said Giles we haue mad a bargaine that the longif lnde of Robert Penn and I to
have both our Estates for Robert is a good quiet honest haunclef man a boord that shewd nott
sayd nott as witt do my hand this 18th day of Feby 1688
