

In the Name of God Amen, I William Clay of the Shire of Warrick County, beinge very sick & weak in body but in
 good sense & memory doe hereby make & ordaine, this my last will & testament as followeth, first I bequeath my
 soule to Almighty God, who gave it me; & trustinge in his mercifull merits that he will wash away all my
 sinnes out of his Remembrance, through the merits & blood of his deere sonne, Iesus Christ, & my body to the
 earth, from whence it was taken, to be buried in decent Christian buriall, as for my worldly and
 temporall estate I ordaine in manner & form followinge; I purpose it is my will to give unto my loving
 Thomas, the sonne of my brother Thomas Clay one shill & pence, w^{ch} I bequeath & bequeath. Item I give &
 bequeath unto Mary, the youngest daughter of Henry Kynally, one pence, & a roone raffe. in raffe it
 be removed from the window. Further I doe give to my brother John my boy, that was my fathers
 boy w^{ch} I lost & he, & a broad cloth coat, & a pair of breeches. After my death, & things settled. It
 is my will, that the first man should, that the window may doth bring, that is my son, his dearest
 unto my brother John his daughter Elizabeth Clay. Item it is my will my lands & tenements to my
 daughter Elizabeth Clay, my wife Judith Clay, havinge her life therein, And as for all my whole estate
 as, chattels, or hoggs, house hold stuff, or any other thinge belonginge to me; the aforesaid William Clay
 do be equally divided, betweene my deere wife, Judith Clay, & my deere child, after my death, be paid. I doe
 also ordaine that my deere wife, Judith Clay, & my whole executory & administrato: of this my will to
 be it executed, & within my hand & seal, this tenth day of January 1675

I Thomas Gross beinge sick & weak in body but in good sense & memory, I doe make this my last
 will & testament. In the Name of God Amen; Item I will & bequeath my soul to God, who gave it
 me; & my body to the earth, from whence it came; Item I will & bequeath unto my eldest
 sonne, William Gross, & to my youngest sonne Francis Gross; a part of land w^{ch} I now live upon on
 the westward side of the swampe, that runneth by my orchard: firste side w^{ch} the house & orchard
 belonginge unto it, & then & then livinge for ever; Item I will & bequeath unto my sonne Thomas Gross;
 a part of land w^{ch} litle, on the other side of the swampe unto him & his heirs for ever. And if either of
 my sonnes die without issue; his part, to be equally divided, the other two; Item I will & bequeath unto my
 eldest sonne, John Gross, two hundred, of two years old; one black & white & the other red & white one in
 Item I will & bequeath unto my sonne, John Gross; one red one; & one black & white; & one red
 about two or three years of age; Item I will & bequeath unto my youngest sonne, Francis, Gross one
 cow; w^{ch} is named Jane; & one red heifer, of two years old; Item I will & bequeath unto my
 daughter, Susana Gross one silver spoon; Item I will & bequeath unto my youngest daughter, Mary
 Gross, a good ringe & five pence dishes and one pewter basin; Item I give & bequeath unto my deere
 be wife, Susana Gross the third of my land; for her life, & the rest of my estate, w^{ch} I doe
 make my deere & lovinge executory & administrato: to this my last will & testament as with my hand & seal
