I give and bequeath to my Loving Son Charles Goodrich, Samuel Goodrich and George Goodrich ten shillings each of them.

I give and bequeath to William Moreland one feather bed with room, the linen as it stands with all pertonances there belonging & a new bed tick with to make.

I desire that Edward Wood should be sold for his own & to be at his own disposal to do as he shall see it fit & be at liberty from all persons whatever.

I give and bequeath all the Land whereon I am now possessed with the all twenty two acres more or less to be equally divided betwixt Thomas Moreland and John Goodrich my sons in law to them and their heirs for ever.

I give and bequeath unto them all the rest of my Estate Real & personal to be equally divided betwixt them both paying first my debts and then my legacies further I do make and ordain them both my wife and so to the effect of this my last will and Testament In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this day and Year above written Signed sealed published pronounced and declared by the said George Goodrich as his last will and Testament in the presence of us.
