My I give to my Sister Elizabeth Scott my new silver tumbler.

My I give to my friend James Turner the sum of eight pounds in money.

My I give for all the rest of my Estate when my just debts are paid to the within
1000 without give to be equally divided between my son George Norwor-
thy and my Daughter Christian Norworthy and it is my will & desire that
my brother in Law William Scott have the care of their Estate & bring
them up and giving them what schooling he shall see fit but in case they
shall be the day in their minority when then it is my desire and I give it
that I give to them to be divided to be equally divided between my brother
in Law William Scott the children of William Owland and also to make
and ordain my brother in Law William Scott my only Executor
of this my last will & Testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto

one thousand seven hundred and thirty seven I James Ingles of the County of
Wigtown being very weak in body but of perfect sound
memory thanks be to almighty God for it & calling to mind the certainty
of death but the uncertainty of the time when I should be called to
this my last will & Testament revoking & annulling all other wills & wills
Testament & Testament by me heretofore made & this to be taken only for my
last will & Testament in manner & form following First and Principally

I recommend my soul to Almighty God who gave it and my body to the Earth to be buried in such sort and manner as it shall seem convenient to my burying hereafter named and as to my Temporal Estate which it hath pleased God to give me I give and bequeath as followeth.

Item I give & bequeath to Mary Solley my dearly beloved wife one fourth part of all my moveable Estate that please God to bless me with at the time of my departure hence.

Item I give & bequeath unto John Solley & Elizabeth my son & daughter three hundred acres of Land lying on John Putson & Christopher Heywood equally to be divided between my said son John & Elizabeth only excepted that my son John shall have the choice of the Land when it is divided.

Item I give & bequeath unto my son James Solley the plantation he at knoweth on to him & his heirs for ever but if my son James Solley dy & without issue then to return to his brother John Solley and his sister Elizabeth Solley to be equally divided between them.

Item my will is that my son James Solley when he comes of age accorde in open Court to his brother John Solley & his sister Elizabeth Solley a certain tract of Land lying on the Land of Parson Braswell containing three hundred so acres more or less or to pay them thirty thousand pounds of Gold apiece and if my daughter Elizabeth chance to dy without issue then her part to return to her brother John Solley and his heirs for ever.

Item I give & bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth Solley one new bed ticking and bolster.

Item my will is that there shall be no appraisment of my Estate.

Item and my will is that my sons John & James Solley do live with my wife Mary Solley until they shall arrive at the age of twenty and one years of age and also my daughter Elizabeth my will is that she shall live with her said mother until she arrive at the age of eighteen or at the time of marriage.

Item I constitute make & ordain my loving wife Mary Solley to be my only sole executrix of this my last will & Testament as witness my hand & seal the day & year above written. James Solley (Seal)

Signed sealed & delivered in the presence of us John Roberts, Clerk to the Heywood, John Smalley.

And we the three hundred acres of Land left to John Solley & Elizabeth my son & daughter is left to them & their heirs for ever & it is said three hundred so acres of Land that is lying on
