I James Baker of the County of Isle of Wight being weak in Body but of perfect Sense and Memory do make & declare this my last Will & Testament hereby revoking all former Wills by me made. And first & principally I give my Soul to Almighty God and my Body to the Earth to be buried in a Christian & decent manner by my Executor hereafter named, and as for my Worldly Estate I give the same as followeth. First I Bequeath the Use of my Mill and walking Lane to my Son Robert

Smelly for his natural life and after his Decease then I give the said
 Will and gave to my Grandson John Smelly and his heirs forever.
 Item. I Give to my Son Robert's Wife my Comblet Clock
 Item I Give & Bequeath to my Grandsons Robert & Thomas
 Smelly all my Pewter and other Things that is at their Fathers
 Robert Sinellys to be equally divided between them, and each
 of them a Bed, Bedstead and a Trugg, these things being already
 in their possession, and to Robert a brass Kettle. Item.
 I Give to Elizabeth Smelly my Son Lewis's Wife all the Goods
 and other Things she hath of mine, and the Money she owe me,
 to dispose of as she thinks fitt amongst her Children. Item
 I Give to Joshua Whitney jun. son of my Granddaughter when he
 comes to Age of Twenty one Year my Negro Boy Luke, but if
 he Dye before he come to Age then I Give the said Negro to Lewis
 Boyner Son of William Boyner. Item. I Give & Bequeath
 unto my Grandson John Smelly all the rest & residue of my
 Estate whatsoever or wheresoever not already disposed ~~except~~
 one silver Tankard which I bequeath the Use of to her and
 after her Death to the Eldest Son of their Bodies. And I
 do hereby Nominate & Appoint my Grandson John Smelly
 my whole and sole Executor of this my last Will and
 Testament. As Witness my Hand & Seal this Sixth
 Day of February 1732
