In the name of God Amen. I George Parker of
the Isle of Wight County being very Sick & Weak in Body but of
perfect Mind & Memory Praise be to Almighty God do make this to
be my last Will & Testament in manner & form as followeth (Viz)
First I bequeath my Soul to God who gave it, hoping through the
Merits of my Blessed Saviour Jesus Christ to have Pardon for all
my sins, and as for my Body to be Interred in the Earth to have
a Christian Burial according to the discretion of my Executors
hereafter named, and as for all my Worldly Goods God hath
endowed me withall I Give in manner as followeth. Imprimis
I Give unto my Daughter Mary Parker my best Feather Bed and
Furniture, my Loom and all the Furniture belonging to it, a small
Chest, my great Iron Pott, a Linnen spinning Wheel, and a Woolen
spinning Wheel, two Pewter Dishes, one Cow, and two Ewes. Item
I Give unto my Son John Parker my second best Feather Bed and
Furniture, a great Chest, a Gun & Swords, an Iron Pistle and a pair
of Milliards, two Cows, 2 Ewes, two Hogs, two pewter Dishes, and
one Iron Pott. Item. I Give unto Henry King one Cow & calf.
Item. I Give unto John Gray one Cow. Item I Give unto
Sarah Weston two Cow Yearlings. Item. I Give unto William
Smith jun^r two Sheep. Item. I Give unto my Son Francis
Parker & my Daughter Elizabeth Parker Three pounds six & shillings and
eleven pence in Cash which I lodge in the Hands of Mr Nathaniel
Bagnall to be equally divided between them when they shall be of Age
and if either of the two Francis or Elizabeth shall Die before they come of Age
then the other to possess the whole Legacy. And as for all the rest of my
Estate both within & without of what nature or quality soever after my Debts
and Funeral Charges are paid I Give to my Son Francis Parker and my
Daughter Elizabeth Parker to be equally divided between them And
I do hereby Constitute & Appoint William Smith jun^r & Henry King
to be my whole & sole Executors to see this my last Will performed In
Witness whereof I have unto set my Hand & Seal this 27th Day of
January one Thousand seven Hundred & Thirty four.

To one Feather Bed and Furniture. To two Old flock Beds and two old Blankets. To 21 head of cattle, To 5 Horse Suggs. To three Iron Potts and one Iron Kettle. To Horse and Bridle & Saddle and Gun. To one Trunk and two Chests and two Tables and three Trunkards. To one Old safe and Arrow and one drawing Knife. To two Axes and one old brass Kettle. To three old saws, one Crook out Saw, Tennant one Hand Saw. To one old whip Saw Iron and one pair of Cart Wheels &c To two Hammers, one pair of Pincers, one pair of Nippers and some old awls and Tacks and two old Hoes broad. To one old grubbing Hoe, and one brass Kettle. To one old frying Pan and four quart Suggs Stone. To eleven pewter Dishes, and four pewter Basons, and one pewter Chamber Pott and five pewter Porringers. To fourteen pewter Plates and five earthen Suggs and one Pitcher. To three Muggs and one small Sugg and three earthen Basons, four earthen Porringers an earthen Cup and five earthen Plates and four drinking Glasses and three small Glass Bottles, and two Pottle Bottles.
