I give & Bequeath to my Loving Wife my Negro fellow Dick & also my Negro Wench Rose, and an Old Negro named Nan to her & her Heirs for ever. Item I give to my Daughter Mary a Negro fellow named Lince, a Negro girl named Lulbark, and a Boy named Bobb, Item I give to my Daughter Martha a Negro boy named Will a Negro Wench named Doll, and a Negro boy named Sam, and farther my Wife being with Child & in case it should live it is my Will that the above Name Negro Boys Bob & Sam already given to my Daughters, be given to him or her, and in case of its Death before he or she shall arrive to the Age of 21 Years or married then to return as afore given, and

66 in case any of my African Children Die before they arrive to the Age
of 21 years or married then it is my Will that the Negroes are Equally
Divided among the Surviving and for then it is my Will and Des-
ire that my Executors hereinafter mentioned should Sell & Dispose of
my plantation in Suffolk Parish Nansemond County, also a Tract
of Land Lying near the Black water containing about 400 Acres
in the Site of Wight County for & towards paying of my Lawfull
Debts and in case that should not be a Sufficiency the Remainder
be taken out of the rest of my personal Estate and all the rest of
my Good & Chattles after my Debts and Legacies are paid to
be Equally Divided Betwixt my Loving Wife and Children mak-
ing her and my friend William Hodges Executors of this my Last
Will and Testament all of which I have here to set my Hand and
Seal this Twenty Sixth Day of October in the Year of our 1739
