Item, I Give and Bequeath to my Sister Deborah my Horse Wholly, And as for the Remainder of my Estate after my Just Debts paid, I Order my Goods to be Sold and to be equally Divided among my Sisters. Item, I Give and Bequeath to Henry Harrison the Cloth and Trimming that is in the Wreath and as for the remainder of my Wearing Apparel I leave to be Equally Divided between Henry Harrison and Thomas Clark.

Item, I Give and Bequeath to Elizabeth Cough a Guinea to Buy her a Mourning Ring, Item, I Give and Bequeath to Henry Harrison my Gun, Item, I Leave to the Minister of the Parish of our Parish for a Funeral Sermon, I do Appoint my Brothers Henry Harrison and Thomas Clark my whole and sole Executors of this my last Will & Testament and my Estate not to be Appraised nor Security Given

 man called Frank and one Quarter part of the Sloop Ketrang.

Item I give and bequeath to my Son Samuel Whitney one Mallico
 boy called Dorrie and one Quarter part of the Sloop Ketrang.

Item I give and bequeath to my Daughter Kolyng and Mallico
 Wench called Jane and the best Cedar Chest in the House and my second
 Best Ford all all the Bean Furniture of the Bed.

Item I give Quith to my Son Joseph Whitney Three silver spoons

Item I give and bequeath to my Daughter Ruth Whitney Three Silver Spoons

Item I give and bequeath to my Son Francis Whitney Three Silver Shavers

Item I give my Daughter Ketrang Whitney one Silver Spoon and one
 Silver Tankard.

Item I give to my Son Samuel Whitney one Silver Spoon and
 the Sloop Ketrang and all my Close aboard the Sloop Ketrang and
 all the Cash both Gold & Silver that is in the Bricks Pocket that
 is aboard.

Item I give to my Son Jeremiah Whitney One Silver Spoon
 My Will and desire is that my Plantation that Lays on Negroes
 Land Houses and Stock may be Sold & Divided Equally among
 my Wife and Childrene and all the Flock and Beef and Salls that
 is due in Carolina and all the skins and Furs that there is in.

I leave my son David Whitney and my son Jeremiah Whitney
 my whole and sole Executors and Recall and Prove all other Wills
 and Testaments that was made before this.
