

In the name of God Amen. I Roger Ingrum being very sick & weak of Body but of perfect Mind to Whom God has given to God for it, do Appoint this my last Will & Testament. First I Give my Soul to God who gave it me, and Body to the Earth to be Buried in a Christian like manner at the Discretion of my Executors and as for my Worldly Estate I give in Form following. Item I Give and Bequeath unto my loving Wife Elizabeth Ingrum my Horse Bridle and Saddle and one Negro Woman named Judy during her Widowhood or Days and afterwards to my Son John Ingrum to him and his Heirs lawfully Begotten for ever. And two Cows & Calves, and likewise my best Bed, and Furniture belonging to it, and four Pewter Dishes, two deep ones and two flat ones and half a dozen Plates and sixteen Spoons, one Iron Pot the smallest in the House, one Box Iron and Grates.

Item. I Give and Bequeath unto my Son John Ingrum one Negro Man named Harry to him and his Heirs lawfully begotten for ever And Two & Twenty Pounds in Cash to him and his Disposal, and four Head of cattle two of them Cows, one Heifer and one Steer and half a dozen Silver Spoons to him and his Heirs lawfully begotten for ever and two Hens, and ten Pigs, one Copper Kettle, four pewter Dishes of the largest and all Troopers Arrows, curb-Bridle, one quart Tankard, half a dozen of Plates, one Iron four Gallon Pott, one falling Table, one Feather Bed with its Furniture belonging to it.

Item. I Give & Bequeath unto my Son Roger Ingrum one Negro Man named Sam to him & Heirs lawfully begotten for ever, one large Iron Pot, one Ten Gallon brass Kettle, one Copper Still as she stands, to him and his Heirs lawfully begotten for ever; four Head of Cattle, one Cow, one Heifer and two Steers, two Hens and ten Pigs, one Iron Pot-rock, one Iron spit, one Feather Bed and its Furniture belonging to it, and Two & Twenty Pounds in Cash to him and his Disposal, four Pewter Dishes, four Plates, and half a dozen of Silver Spoons to him and his Heirs for ever. One pair of Millyards

Item. I Give & Bequeath unto my Daughter Sarah Ingrum one Negro Woman called High, and her Increase all but the first Child to her and her Heirs lawfully begotten for ever, one Feather Bed, Furniture belonging to it one looking glass, and half a dozen of Silver Spoons and Dram Cup if they comes in as I do expect. I Give the Half of Pewter Dishes & Plates besides what is already given away to her, one Iron Pott, one large brass Skimmer & Fleshhook, one Half of all my Earthen Ware, one leather Trunk.

Item. I Give & Bequeath unto my daughter Elizabeth Ingrum one Negro Boy named Peter to her and her Heirs lawfully begotten for ever, and half a dozen Silver Spoons, one Dram Cup if they come in, two brass Saddles, the other part of my Earthen Ware and Glass all of it. One Heifer, one Steer, two Sow Shoats. I Give and Bequeath unto my Son Richard Ingrum

Thirty pounds Cash to him and his Disposal and Seven Shells.

I Give bequeath unto my son William Ingrum Thirty pounds Cash to him and his Disposal, and Seven and half a dozen of Leather Chairs one small Table, Vis my Desire that twenty Barrells of Corn be sold and divided between my two Sons Richard & William Ingrum

I Give and bequeath unto my son Roger Ingrum one falling Table, one new Chest with a Lock & Key.

I Give and bequeath unto my son John Ingrum one Chest with a Lock & Key.

And tis my Desire that all my Carpenters & Coopers Tools be equally divided between my two eldest Sons John & Roger, and the rest of my Estate to be equally divided between my four Youngest Children

And I do Appoint Thomas Shelley & Benjamin Hodges my whole & sole Executors of this my last Will & Testament making Void all others formerly by me made, And tis my Desire that my Estate should not be Appraised here is As Witness my Hand & Seal this Twelfth Day of March 1733/4

The last Will & Testament of Roger Ingrum deceased was presented in Court by Elizabeth Ingrum his Widow who informing the Court that the Executors - - therein mentioned refused to take upon them the Burthen of Executorship which was considered by the Court, and the said Will being first duly approved by the Oaths of William Dixon & William Atkinson. Fire-Shovel. To eight Pewter Dishes, five Plates, one Warringer,
fifteen spoons, one Tankard, To one Pewter Bottle, one old Gold Still,
and one Spice Mortar & Pestle. To one Candlestick & snuffers, One
Warming Pan, one Box Iron. To one Trunk, To six Glass Bottles.
Two earthen Chamber Potts, two Cups, two Mugs, To three Stone Jugs,
one Butter Pott. To one Horse, Saddle, & Bridle, two pair Pott-hooks
one Potrack. To 600 pounds of Tobacco. To ten suits of Apparels,
two Quilts, three Petticoats, One Cloke, To one pair of Slays, four pair
