

In the Name of God. Amen. The twenty fourth Day
 of February 1746. William Brewer Sen^r of the Parishes of Virginia
 in Newport Parish of Isle of Wight County Planter, being very sick and
 weak in Body, but of perfect Mind and Memory, thanks be given to
 almighty God, therefore calling to mind the Mortality of my Body and
 knowing that it is appointed for all Men once to die, do make and beleave
 this my last Will and Testament. That is to say. Principally and
 first of all. I Give and Recommend, my Soul into the Hands of God that
 gave it, and my Body I commend, to the Earth, to be Buried, in decent
 and Christian Burial, at the Discretion of my Executors, nothing
 doubting, but at the generall Resurrection, I shall receive the same
 again by the mighty Power of God, and as touching such worldly
 Estate, wherewith It hath pleased God to bless me in this Life, I have
 Demised and Dispose of the same In the following Manner I Nom
 Imprimis, I Give and Bequeath, to my dearly beloved Wife Catherine, I give
 the one Half of all my moveable Estate, to her proper Use and Disposal
 forever &c

Item I Give and Bequeath, to my well beloved Son George Brewer the
 Plantation, whereon I now dwell, with all the Lands I hold, adjoining being
 one Hundred and fifty Acres more or less to him the said George Brewer
 his Heirs and Assigns forever, and two Cows and Calves I owe him I leave
 it being his full Share, of all my worldly Estate, & my Will and Desire is
 that my S^r Son George, do pay all my worldly Debts or doe not to have
 the above^d Plantation, & to pay to my Daughter Mary Brewer and
 my Daughter Sarah Brewer Eight Parralls of Lawfull Salt, a Piece
 & in Case my Son George shall refuse to pay according to my Desire
 my Desire is, that my dearly beloved Wife Catherine shall sell the S^d
 Plantation to pay the same above mentioned &c

Item My Will and Desire is, that the Rest of all my moveable Estate, and
 Debts due, be equally, divided amongst my four Daughters, namely
 Mary and Sarah and Elizabeth and Christian &c

Item I Give and Bequeath to my beloved Son Michael Brewer, the Value
 of one Shilling Sterling it being his full Share of my Estate, &c

Item I Give and Bequeath, to my well beloved Son, William Brewer the
 Value of one Shilling Sterling it being his due Share of my Estate &c

Item

I Give and Bequeath unto my beloved Son John Brewer the Value of one Shilling Sterling it being his part thereof my Estate & Likewise do make and Ordain my beloved Wife Catherine my Son George my Sole Executors of this my last Will and Testament and hereby utterly disallow revoke and Disannull all other former Will Testaments Legacies & Bequest to and Executors by me in any wise before named Will & Bequeaths Ratifying & conforming this and no other to be my last Will and Testament
In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my Hand & Seal this Day & Date first above Written

William Brewer his Mark

At a Court held for Tots of Right County October 5th 1749 -
The last Will and Testament of William Brewer deceased was presented in Court by George Brewer one of the Executors therein named who made Oath thereto & being proved by the Oath of Samuel Corbit one of the Witnesses thereto is Ordained to be Recorded
