In Memory of God Almighty I John Gent being sick and weak in my body but sound and perfect in mind and souced thankes be to God for it so softow my worldly good as hallo wotke In the first place I command my spirit into the handes of our Lord Jesud Christ my only saviour and my body committed to the ground and after my funeral charg'd and my debts paid I bequeath all my worldly good as followeth In the first place I leave and bequeath to my eldest son Edward Gent

(63) and his heirs this plantation that I now live on with one hundred and fifty acres of land belonging to it and I bequeath the other hundred and fifty acres of land to my youngest son John Gent and his heirs.
3/ I give & bequeath to my Eldest son Edward Gent my gun and the other two of my valuable miscall estate to him and his heirs.
4/ I give and bequeath the other two thirds of my estate equally divided betwixt my loving wife and my youngest son John Gent and their heirs and I acknowledge this to be my last will and Testament as witness my hand & seal this 29 day of December 1728 And I appoint my friend Oliver Woodward witness
Thomas Allen to be my Executor to see my last will & Testament is carried out
