In the name of God Amen. I George D Hazlewood of the County of James City and State of Virginia of sound mind and disposing memory do make this as my last will and Testament. First. I leave to my wife Susan during her natural life the farm on which I now reside containing one hundred and sixteen acres, adjoining the lands of James N Goddin and Wm O Noekaday's Estate and the lands herein after given to the body heirs of my son John Westley Hazlewood. I also leave to my wife all the personal property including horses, Cattle, Hogs &c which I may have in possession at the time of my death and for her to hold the same during her natural life - The land and appurtenances upon which my son John Westley resides containing one hundred acres, I give to the heirs of his body forever -

The land herein before loaned to my wife Susan during her life time containing one hundred and sixteen acres, at the death of my wife I give to the heirs of the body of my son George Whitfield Hazlewood forever provided he will pay to my son John Westley, one Hundred dollars and to my daughter Elizabeth Rebecca Sweeney. One Hundred Dollars.

And the farm upon which my son in law Stephen B. Sweeney resides containing one hundred and ninety one acres adjoining the lands of Cary Wilkinson and others I give to the heirs of the body of my daughter Elizabeth Rebecca Sweeney.

The residue of my property monies &c. I wish to be equally divided between my three children

At a Quarterly Court held for the County of
James City and the City of Williamsburg at the
Courthouse thereof in said City on Monday the
10th day of June 1872.

A writing bearing date on the 3rd day of July 1871 purporting to be
the last will and testament of George P. Hazlewood decd. was this day
produced in Court, and upon the testimony of John A. Richardson and
Vernon P. Jones, two subscribing witnesses thereto, who made oath that
George P. Hazlewood decd. acknowledged and subscribed the same as his
last will and testament in their presence, they all being present at the
same time, and they the said John A. Richardson and Vernon P. Jones, at the
request of said testator, and in his presence and in the presence of each
other subscribed the same as witnesses, which said last will and
Testament being fully proven to the satisfaction of the Court. It is
ordered that the said writing bearing date on the 3rd day of July 1871
be recorded as and for the true last will and testament of George P.
Hazlewood decd.

And on the motion of John W. Hazlewood by his attorney, he
is permitted to qualify as administrator, with the last will annexed of
George P. Hazlewood decd, whereupon he appeared in Court and took the
several oaths prescribed by law, and together with Vernon P. Jones as
his security (who justified on oath as to his sufficiency) entered into and
acknowledged a Bond in the penalty of fourteen hundred Dollars
Conditioned as the law directs, and it is ordered that letters of Administration
be made out in due form of law for John W. Hazlewood as administrator
with the will annexed of George P. Hazlewood decd.
